

I am very pleased to say that cataloguing is now up to date, waiting of course for the next donation. For cataloguing purposes the KAV Heritage Collection has been divided into five main groups:

Current and recent Heritage Projects

As part of the 90th Anniversary celebrations, with the theme of Kazzie Weddings, I showed the Allan Creswell tapes of Kazzie Wedding Photographs at the May Seniors meeting. The Seniors loved them, not just the Victorian tapes but also those from NSW and Western Australia. It was very touching to hear and observe their responses as they recognised their extended families in the photos, to the continual cries of "stop the tape, stop the tape!" Also on display were items from the KAV Heritage Collection depicting Kazzie wedding costumes as well as actual costume items including the gouna (donated by Winnie and Alex Hetrelezi) which Christine Dimer modelled for all to see.

I am presently working on the theme of Kazzie Picnics 1925 - 2015 for a slide show to be shown at the June Seniors meeting. I also intend to make hard copies of each slide and display them around the clubrooms so members can assist in dating and identifying the people in each photo. Photographs have, in the main been sourced from the KAV Collection but if you have any photographs you would like included please send them to me ASAP.

The next Seniors' project is Kazzie Dances 1925 – 2015 including dances, taverna nights, parties, weddings and the like. If you have any group photos from any eras of Kazzies getting together, please send them to me and if possible date and identify the people in the photos.

After being contacted by Helen Pappas and Anna Coutsis, I visited and interviewed Beryl Georgakopoulos (nee Nittes) for their proposed publication/project titled Kastellorizian Kerasma – Food Evoking Memories. At present I am transcribing the material before I send it to Sydney and will also make a copy for our own KAV Collection.

I will be working with Connie Gregory to make available items from our archives for the coming display "Treasures from Kastellorizo" scheduled for August and assisting in the sourcing of other items.

National Womens Day

The facilitator of the event was Dina Gerolymou – a producer with SBS. Marika is to be congratulated on her eloquent speech.

My name is Marika Bisas and I was born in Port Said in Egypt on the 25th of March 1929. My family arrived in Australia in 1934, when I was just five and we could not speak a word of English. So I am honoured today, 80 years later, to be invited to speak on my life's achievements at the Hellenic Women's Cultural Association on this International Women's Day occasion, of noting Greek women's contributions to Australia.

When my family first arrived in Australia, it was not the tolerant multi-cultural country that it is today. Being practically first immigrants, times were hard for us then, both financially and culturally. But over time we learned to live in the best of both worlds, retaining our Greek heritage, language and religion, yet adopting the Australian way of life.

While in Australia we were the 'Greeks', in Greece we were the 'Australians' - what a loss of identity. My ancestors were from the island of Kastellorizo, the furthest island from mainland Greece. Its history shows that it was invaded by many countries – Turkey, Italy, Germany, France and England to name a few – but it is now proudly Greek.

As well as working extremely hard in Australia to



establish his family, my father George Koutsoukis was always involved in the Greek community and I think those 'genes' were handed down to me. My husband Jack Bisas, also a Kastellorizian, born in Australia 90 years ago, has the same 'genes' for community service.

Jack and I have been blessed with 61 years of happy marriage, two sets of twins (Eula, Ian, George and Jim) and five wonderful grandchildren (Jacqueline, Simeon, Adriana, Jack Junior and Sam).

My very first taste of community involvement was when I was 17, as the sports secretary responsible for forming the first Greek girls' basketball team as part of the Greek Olympic Athletic Club, and then as representative to the Greek branch of The Red Cross for the club.

Being Kastellorizians, my father was an early president, and then my husband Jack was president of the Kastellorizian Association for 15 years, initiating countless formal events and new clubs. He was awarded 'Kazzie' of the year in 1997. I supported him in many ways, and in 2007 was awarded Kazzie of the Year, which was even reported in the Greek newspaper of Kastellorizo, with a picture of me beside the Greek Consul to Australia.

Whilst the governance of the majority of Greek organisations in the 1960s and 1970s remained in the hands of men, I proved that Greek Australian women could also make a significant contribution in a leadership role in these organisations.

As the first president of the Kastellorizian Ladies' Society, I continued in the role over five separate years. A major task for us was raising money to pay off our South Melbourne building in Dorcas Street. I point out that with the support of a committed and hard working committee they, as did future committees of the Ladies Society, raised money to help pay off the mortgage on the club premises. In the broader Greek community, Jack was president of the Australian Greek Welfare Society for 9 years, after the presidency of founder Dr Spiro Moraitis.

During this time, I completed a training course as a voluntary welfare officer for this organisation. My major work for the Australian Greek Welfare Society began when I realised that genuine social provision for elderly Greeks was not formally available. Initially, starting in the back room of a Greek doctor's surgery in Oakleigh, four Greek men came to the first session - women dare not invade. Once I had persuaded the doctor, Dr John Malios, to involve his mother, many Greek women, as well as men began to attend, so much so that we needed more room.

So, I approached the Oakleigh Council. I convinced them of the need for a Senior Citizens group where elderly Greek people, who also paid their local council rates for services, could have a place to enjoy themselves and speak Greek. A separate Weekly session was established.

I took this initiative across to Box Hill, where, after I had asked the priest to announce the possibility at his church service, I worked with the Box Hill Greek Ladies' Auxiliary to set up a Greek Elderly Citizens Club. Richmond became my third location. I held roles as president, secretary and treasurer over the years, and was honoured with a medal for my work, by the Box hill community Ladies Auxiliary.

Of course it soon came to my notice too that Greek women and men were feeling isolated, abandoned and depressed in the nursing homes, which could not cater for them in terms of familiar language, culture or even food. Being acknowledged as the first life governor of the Australian Greek Society for Care of the Elderly, recognising my work of founding the committee, acting as secretary for 7 years and a member of the board for 10 years, for the inaugural Australian Greek Nursing Home. To get to this point, we had to obtain land, clear the bush on it, and hold multiple fundraisers, including radiothons, to then build the Clayton Pronia Nursing Home with the then President – the late John Basil Salvaris and his devoted committee.

We were most gratified when Prime Minister Gough Whitlam officially opened this first Greek Nursing Home with its provision for all levels of care for the elderly. How rewarding that now there are many Greek Elderly Homes across Victoria, a multi-million dollar project.

I shall always be pleased with the success of a fundraising function I organised, before 1966, in which 10,000 pounds was raised in one evening for the Royal Children's Hospital. The large gathering at this special event enjoyed Greek dancing and culture. In recognition of such efforts I was presented with an honorary Life Governorship of the Royal Children's Hospital.

Meanwhile, from the mid-1970s onward, after obtaining my diploma from RMIT, professionally I worked full-time as an interpreter and translator for the Counselling, Guidance & Clinical services of the Education Department.

Also, as the president of VITA (Victorian Interpreters and Translators Association of the Education Department), I worked for better conditions and recognition for both the interpreters and their clients. I even acted as CEO for a short period of time in Myer House in Melbourne - for interpreter services for the ministry of Education representing the work of 34 interpreters across 15 languages in Victoria. It was an attempt to bring structure, professionalism and recognition to the occupation of interpreters.

I have greatly enjoyed my involvement with the charitable organisation AHEPA. In my first term of presidency we raised much money for a wide variety of charities, including for cancer research and Parkinson's Disease, the Fred Hollows Foundation, special needs children and a Home for Autistic children run by the parents in Greece.

I served a second year as president of the Daughters of Penelope Chapter Athena 2. I am very happy to be a member and I cannot begin to tell you how hard members work for the good of the order and all for charity. AHEPA stands to promote Australian Hellenic ideals of Education, Philanthropy, civic responsibility, family and individual excellence.

SBS, in the days when it was known as 3EA, appointed me to an advisory committee to explore the provisions they could make for the Greek community. Following my input that elderly Greeks could no longer attend church physically, a religious element was included in the Greek program aired.

Jack was on the board at Melbourne High School, we attempted to provide Greek as a language, but all students had their own Greek schools – so we settled for Greek religion.

Being presented with an Order of Australia media in 2010, fifteen years after my husband obtained his, it to me a precious recognition of my community work. My most important achievement, I believe, has been promoting the role of Greek women in being able to contribute in formal voluntary roles to our community, and our appreciation of the Australian

nation to which we have been able to contribute. I have been treasurer of ESTIA, the Hellenic Women's Cultural Association, since 1995. It is wonderful, after all my other voluntary organisational endeavours, to belong to this group which provides organisational endeavours, to belong to this group which provides performance, concerts, and exhibitions show-casing Greek culture. I thank them this afternoon, very sincerely for honouring me with this opportunity to speak. I would also like to thank all those wonderful tireless people I had the honour of working with during my life in the community.

As a final tribute, I want to acknowledge my husband Jack who provided such a shining example of tireless commitment to the community. As a team, Jack and I have achieved so much. Our lives have been our family but also the community at large. to my mind, in volunteering it is not so much about the wins and rewards, but the wonderful other volunteers you meet along the way in achieving your goals.

I urge you to do volunteer work, whenever you can: it means so much!



SOCIAL EVENTS

TREASURES FROM KASTELLORIZO FROM THE CABINETS OF THE MEMORY KEEPERS

On the 15-16 August an exhibition of traditional Kastellorizian jewellery, and other items, will be held at our clubrooms. The scope of the exhibition depends on whether we get some funding from the Victorian Multicultural Commission, and we are awaiting news as we go to press.

The idea for this display came out of a small exhibition of Kastellorizian items at the Emerald Hill Cultural Centre as part of a larger display of items that people brought into Australia. It was very well received. It was also rewarding to those who loaned items as it was a way of honouring the original owners and their stories. I will act as the coordinator of the display with the valuable advice of our Archivist/Curator Florence Livery who will also make available items from the KAV Archives.

Call for the loan of items for the exhibition:

Some items will be from the KAV Archives but mostly we want our membership to delve into their cabinets and baoules (chests) to see what they are prepared to share. Each item on display will have a small story with it, and detailing who it belonged to and who is the keeper now. All items should come from Kastellorizo.

I will be approaching some of our members to see what they have, but would appreciate it if you would contact me if you think you have anything to contribute.

I would particularly like Koufokoukia (Kazzie word meaning empty beans) which are gold or silver long multifaceted hollow beads popular on Kastellorizo,(I have never seen them), and a Yelekaki with-



Kouthounakia, which are silver filigree buttons.

We do need examples of the jewellery for which Kastellorizo is famous - gold bracelets, particularly those which incorporate gold coins, earrings, brooches and if anyone has a Psatha (a woven chain of cascading gold coins worn on the chest) that would be a star attraction. I doubt whether anyone has one now, but there might be one hiding away somewhere. Of course all jewellery will be secured in a locked glass case. I will certainly be putting in my own jewellery, but much more is needed.

We are also interested in children's items. We have a few antiques – including a child's talisman – Haimali (filakto); and a Sasouna (child's silver whistle with bells); and a large silver filigree cross. We would like more examples of the triangular Haimali/filakto. I have never seen a square or rectangular one of the type sometimes given to boys and called Kastanakia - it would be wonderful if anyone has one.

It would also be good to have some examples of everyday life such as cooking utensils, dishes, cutlery, bread stamp, spice jars, and the pointed lace runners that lined mantlepieces. Anything at all that came from Kastellorizo which would fit in with the exhibition. Also things like a water pipe, flat irons, doorstops, old komboloi beads etc.

Antique Icons – We have St Michael and St Spyridon, but would really like to have an Icon of Sts Constantine and Helen.

Our archivist Florence Livery will make available several items from the archives, including various garments and a beautiful Krepi silk shawl, but I wonder if anyone has

- a length of the Ikat material (cotton and silk) used for lining garments
- any other materials such as hanks of cotton, wool and silk
- gold thread that were used for embroidery etc.
- any implements used for handiworks, such as the embroidery hoops they used,
- implements for making carpet etc.

Would also like a silk bedding cover – they are usually in a floral silk, lined in lkat fabric.

The exhibition will be photographed and documented and will be a valuable resource for our Archives. At this stage the exhibition is planned to be open for two days, but it may be that the opening times are extended. We will see.

There is quite a lot of work entailed in putting this exhibition together. If anybody would like to assist, please let me know.


Talk by Nicholas Bogiatzis on Kastellorizian Jewellery



VALE DAISY PANOURIAS (NEE AUGUSTES)

Anastasia (Daisy) Panourias was born in 1935, the fifth and youngest child of Emmanuel and Flora Augustes (nee Georgiou). Daisy's older siblings were Angelo, John, Peter and Grace. Emmanuel was one of the earliest Kazzies in Melbourne, arriving in Fremantle in 1917 and coming across to Melbourne in 1919, via the forests and timber mills south of Perth and the Port Pirie Smelter. Flora migrated to Adelaide in 1926 just two weeks after the earthquake hit Kastellorizo.

The Augustes children grew up in Balaclava where Emmanuel ran a fruit shop on Carlisle Street for 35 years.

Daisy was part of a large extended family as her father was the eldest of eight children, all of who, by 1922 had migrated to Australia – sisters Florrie Conos, Asimina Jackomos, Mihalakina Pavles, Zabetta Xanthos and brothers Peter, Michael and Theodore. As her mother's family lived in Adelaide, on most weekends Flora would take her daughters to visit their Carlton Augustes cousins. This was the foundation of life long friendships and connection between these cousins.

Daisy met her husband Spiro Panourias at the engagement party of her cousin, Katina Fermanis. Spiro had just arrived from Thessaloniki and so was considered an xeni by her family but despite strong opposition they were married in 1955. Spiro and Daisy made a great partnership, both personally and at work. They operated a series of successful businesses, mainly to do with food. However, the greatest joy of their lives was the arrival of their son Michael in 1969. They were devoted to him and Michael became the centre of their lives.

Spiro died in 2000. These last 15 years, while adjusting to life on her own, have seen an expansion in Daisy's life – grandchildren Zac and Gracen, an interest in politics and current affairs, an avid reader, family history, time to educate herself about healthy eating and perfecting her excellent cooking skills.

Daisy will be sadly missed by all.

DESMOS FOR KASTELLORIZIAN SCHOOLS

In late 2014 the local high school on Kastellorizo recieved a significant donation from Desmos, which is a charitable non-governmental organisation operating from Athens & Thessalloniki.

The donations, included:

- 6 personal computers, a UPS and CD player for its IT laboratory
- o a fully-fitted Biochemistry Laboratory, which included laboratory shirts, heating and laser equipment and electricity models
- o Art and stationary supplies
- o Sports equipment
- o First Aid kits

The KAV wishes the children and teachers all the best for the future and hope they now have better opportunities in their tertiary studies. and for their future Desmos identifies businesses which may have surplus items, such as furniture, books, stationery, medical products and electrical goods.

They then pass on these goods to social welfare organisations throughout Greece who distribute them to the needy. In two years of operation, Desmos has distributed over €1 million in support to such welfare organisations.

In 2014, Desmos initiated the Desmos for Schools program and distributed equipment & expendables to 25 Schools of 9 Remote Islands in the Aegean Sea (Astipalaia, Anafi, Iraklia, Schinoussa, Chalki, Simi, Nisiros, Kastellorizo, Serifos) & 1 Children's Playground in Amorgos.

LEADING BY EXAMPLE - RECYCLE

Kastellorizo has a recycling programme that was set up last year by its non-profit organisation, Drasi Kastellorizou.

With donations from expat Australians, Italians, English, South Africans they have bought an electric car (solar powered) and a compressor to compact the materials. This project has also provided 1.5 jobs for the small community.

In the inaugural season they collected over 30,000 plastic bottles! This year they hope to expand materials collected to include glass and batteries.

On March 18 the high school students and teachers of Kastellorizo took an excursion of a different kind. Armed with sticks and nail prongs, they walked the roads of their island for two hours picking up recyclable materials especially plastics, paper and aluminium.

They worked towards the space where the compressor is located and helped load up the machine with their overloaded bags, learning how the materials are packed for easy transport, sent to Rhodes and then on to companies on the mainland to be recycled.

It was a day of camaraderie and fun, and most importantly, it was done with strong community spirit. It is heartwarming to see the next generation caring for the future of their homeland.
