The past few months have been very busy indeed. In the presence of the Consul General for Greece Ms. Eleni Lianidou and the Member for Albert Park, Mr. Martin Foley several students were presented with their VCE bursaries, and each one spoke admirably to the fascination and interest of the audience. The Kastellorizian of the Year Award for 2012 was presented to Michael Nicholas Spartels. This popular and prestigious award recognised his unfailing commitment to the KAV and the Greek community generally. His loyalty to the Kastellorizian Club as well as other institutions is well known and acts as an inspirational role model to both the young and old. News from the Megisteon Heritage Society

Over the past few months I have been very busy identifying gaps in our archives. I am very pleased to say that as word gets out, the gaps are slowly closing. This has included visits to past office bearers of the Association as well as members who have their own collections of documents and artefacts relating to the club and Kastellorizo. Policies and procedures are in place and once donations have been considered as suitable to the collection, they are secured, properly housed and future access supervised. Because of this, members are gradually becoming only too willing and pleased to make appropriate additions to the *Megisteon Heritage Collection*.

The present archival focus is:

- 1. Records from past office bearers minutes, personal papers to do with Kazzie business
- 2. Club newsletters with the present run of Kazzie News which Jack Bisas began in late 1982. We are now only missing editions 14, 19 and 95. Also, pre-1982, other versions of newsletters existed which we have very few of.
- 3. Fliers, brochures and memorabilia of past club events.

We are also very keen to enhance our electronic photographic collection, particularly of past club events and group photos such as weddings and picnics. Photos of past committees. Photos of each past president of both the Brotherhood and the Ladies Committees.

Along with this I have attended numerous workshops to enhance my skills in curating, archiving, cataloguing, historical research and electronic photo management, all at no expense to the club. These workshops have been held by the Public Record Office of Victoria, The State Library of Victoria, Museum Victoria, the Genealogical Society of Victoria and Box Hill TAFE. The association is now a member of Museums of Australia (Victoria) and the Oral History Association of Victoria. I also have worked very closely with Annette Welkamp in undertaking the Significance Assessment of our heritage collection and we eagerly await her final report.

We also need to remind ourselves that the main reason we are doing all of this is to ensure that the Kazzie story will be told, particularly that of Kazzies in Victoria. A comprehensive collection makes research so much easier as I have found in my present endeavours in researching the history of the Young Men's Castellorizian Society (YMCS), founded in 1962.

To read through the minutes of the Castellorizian Ladies Society committee meetings is an absolute joy and privilege, to witness how the Ladies tried in vain to support this youth group, through their many social events, with waning support from the Senior Brotherhood.

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

The program for the Anniversary event will focus on igniting your memories through a series of photographic displays, short presentations, candid reflections from invited speakers and the audience.



St Constantine and St Helen's Day Celebrations and Awards

The Kastellorizian Association of Victoria celebrated St Constantine and St Helen Day on Sunday the 20th of May. Father Demetrious conducted an intimate service at St Constantine and St Helen Greek Orthodox Church, South Yarra for his regular congregation and approximately 15 members of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria which included the Association's President, Yvonne Panagacos and the 2012 Kastellorizian of Year, Michael Spartels. Following the service, Father Demetrious proceeded to give his sermon and at the conclusion welcomed the members of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria. He outlined to the congregation the role that the Kastellorizians have played in the Greek community. He also mentioned the Kastellorizian involvement with St Constantine and St Helen Greek Orthodox Church South Yarra and their participation each year on Church Saint's Day. Father Demetrious went on to explain the principle behind the Kastellorizian of the Year Award and introduced Michael Spartels to the congregation and outlined his achievements and involvement in the community.

Afterward the members who attended the Church service made their way to the Association's Clubrooms where they joined the other awardees and their families for the feast day celebration and award presentations. Once again the catering was sponsored by the Association and provided by Kartel Catering. As recorded in the guest book, the waiting staff served approximately 81 guests with the standard variety of finger food and drinks. Invited quests who attended included the Consul General of Greece Mrs. Eleni Lianidou, Mr. Martin Foley, MP, former Kastellorizians of the Year, Jack and Marika Bisas OAM and John B Salvaris OAM. Previous recipients of the Kastellorizian of the Year Award. Professor Byron Kakulas, former Senator Nick Bolkus, along with the President of the Greek Orthodox Community, Bill Papastergiadis sent their apologies. However they conveyed congratulations to Michael and the recipients of the KYAA, VCE Recognition awards.

Following the arrival of the Consul General of Greece and the official presentation promptly began with Mrs. Yvonne Panagacos and Mrs. Eleni Lianidou awarding the VCE Awards to the recipients. **Erasmia Antonopoulos**, **Samantha Garrick**, and **Josh Pavlou** (photograph 2, page 11) accepted their awards eagerly and gave a brief speech about their current pursuits. **Kristal Kostoglou** was unable to attend the presentation, however, her proud grandmother, **Christalla Bisas** accepted the award.

Kristen Mihalos was presented with both the VCE and Kastellorizian Youth Achievement Awards. Kristen delighted not only her parents and grandparents but the entire audience with a candid and confident speech where she outlined her future plans and explained to the audience what her Kastellorizian heritage meant to her and how it has help shaped her into the person she is today.

Yvonne then introduced Mr. Michael Spartels and summarised his long list of achievements which resulted in his award of Kastellorizian of 2012. Mrs Lianidou presented Michael with the Kastellorizian of the Year Award and he made an (photograph 1 page 11) emotional speech outlining the role the Kastellorizian Community, in particular, Association has played in his life. Michael also emphasised the importance of family and notably the extended family. He later thanked his wife, Dianne and his children for their continued supported over the years and also expressed how proud he is of their involvement as individuals in their support of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria. The presentations concluded on a high note when the Consul General of Greece delivered a very impressive speech explaining her knowledge and ties with Kastellorizo, through her travels to the island, her many interactions with Kastellorizians and her knowledge of Kastellorizian history and the current political issues that surround Kastellorizo sovereignty. She said how impressed she was of our community's recognition and preservation of the Kastellorizian heritage irrespective of the fact that members of the community range from Kastellorizian immigrants to fourth generation Australian-Kastellorizians.

After the formalities, the guests enjoyed a variety of sweets which included home made baklava supplied by the Committee along with tea and coffee.



<u>Castellorizian Association of WA:</u> Centenary Celebrations

Recently I attended the 100 year Anniversary for the formation of the Kastellorizian Association of Western Australia. Due to my participation at the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria's St Constantine and St Helen's Day Celebrations and Awards presentation, along with my work commitments I was unable to leave for Perth until the afternoon of the 21st of May.

For me the celebrations began with the Conference which was held at the Castellorizian Association of Western Australia's clubhouse in Mount Hawthorne. about 20 minutes from the CBD. I walked down the path and into the entrance hall to a sea of unfamiliar faces. Catherine Papanastasiou, the Secretary of the Steering Committee for the Celebrations appeared out of the crowd to welcome me. After a few introductions to Kenneth Michael, Byron and Bartley Kakulas, Nicholas and Mary Nicholas and Jim Manifis, I entered the conference room and met more "Kazzies" from all over Australia. Finally, I started to put faces to the many famous Kastellorizians names. The Victorian group consisted of Yvonne and George Panagacos, Paul and Connie Gregory, Christine Dimer, James and Jane Paltos, Michelle Hondros, Betty Adgemis, George and James Verginis and not forgetting John C Mangos. Some of you may disagree with John's inclusion but as the saying goes "you can take the boy out of Melbourne but you can't take Melbourne out of the boy!"

Master of Ceremonies, Bartley Kakulas invited the President of the Castellorizian Association of WA, Mr. Jim Manifis to the stage. Jim welcomed all the attendees, the numerous interstate delegates and invited speakers.

The first speaker of the program was Kastellorizian historian, Mr Nicholas Pappas. Nicholas began by describing the life on Kastellorizo in its' "heyday" in the mid 1800's when Kastellorizo was wealthy due to the privileges it shared with is Ottoman rulers, the prolific ship building, merchant trade and the lucrative sponges market. Then Nicholas explained how technology, that is; the arrival of the steam ship, the tightening of Ottoman privileges, subsequent decline in trade and the economy, numerous wars, invasion by a variety of different foreign powers and natural disasters all took its toll on the Island and its people.

Over morning I endeavoured to make my way to the scrumptious selection of sweet treats at the morning tea table but I was side tracked by conversation.

I learnt from the other Melbournians what had transpired at the Sunday Registration BBQ and the Church service and Feast Day Luncheon of Saints Constantine and Helene. From all accounts, the Church service was spectacular. The service was delivered by nine Greek Orthodox Priests and accompanied by magnificent Byzantine chants from the Cantors. The magnificence of the day is depicted below.

The second session of Day One was conducted by Dr John Yiannakis. His topic covered the arrival of the Kastellorizians in Western Australia. He discussed their role in the Greek Community in Perth and their assimilation in the Australian Community. Later he highlighted the influence that Kastellorizians played in fields of medicine, dentistry, the commerce and local politics. At times John was somewhat controversial as he explained that the Kastellorizians were not always the first Greeks to make notable achievements in the Greek community of WA but they were in the forefront.

At the conclusion of the first session, I thought of the hardships our ancestors went through, both here and in Australia and how lucky we are to reap the rewards of their hard work and courage 100 years later.

The next day, I arrived at the conference a little "jetlagged" and the caffeine boost from my breakfast coffee had not kicked in. However, I soon "woke up" to the raw of laughter from the audience when John Mangos opened his witty, thought provoking and controversial presentation 'Kastellorizian culture -Dilution and Demise". John's presentations brought to the fore the topical issues that many young Kazzies face growing up in a Kazzie family in present day Australia. As I listened it dawned on me how these issues also impact on the future of the Kastellorizian Associations in general. John also raised concerns regarding the economic and political climate faced in our ancestral homeland, Greece. The audience listened attentively. At the conclusion a barrage of questions was raised and an excellent debate followed. As many Melbournian Kazzies could not attend, John has kindly allowed us to print a précis of his talk (see page 24 and 25).

Prior to lunch, Marilyn Tsolakis gave an excellent summary of the conference and skilfully put the speaker's topics into perspective.

It would have been very difficult to return to the next session after the generous lunch, if it wasn't for the final presentation by the Kastellorizian genealogy wizard, Mr Allan Cresswell. Allan surveyed the audience and selected seemingly unrelated people from the various states. With a wave of his magic wand he linked the group and identified them as relatives either through blood ties or marriage. The room was abuzz as everyone discovered newly found relatives sitting close by.

At the conclusion of the conference, I left thinking that all the topics discussed at this event were something every Kastellorizian should hear at least once in their lifetime. However I was somewhat disappointed that the young Kazzie descendents did not attend or did not have the opportunity to do so.

On Wednesday evening, an official reception was hosted by the Lord Mayor of Perth to commemorative the Centenary of the Castellorizian Association of WA. The reception was held at the Civic Centre.

During the course of the evening, I was impressed to discover the relationship between the City of Perth and many Kastellorizians over the last 100 years. I was in awe that the City of Perth held the Kastellorizians in such high esteem that they officially established sister city relationships with Kastellorizo (and Rhodes) in the 1980's.

Thursday was scheduled as a free day and I had hoped to explore the sites of Perth. Instead, I chose to accept the very welcoming invitations from a number of Perth Kazzies. Yvonne and I were driven to Kings Park by Stacey Doucas . We arrived at the café in centre of Kings Park. The views from the enormous windows of the café were spectacular. The ambience of enjoying the outdoors from inside was further assisted by the beautiful sunny weather. At the café we met our hosts Faye Katris, President of the Castellorizian Ladies Association of WA and the ladies from the Committee (see photograph below). Also invited were representatives from the Castellorizian Ladies Auxiliary of NSW. There was so much chatter that the morning passed very quickly and we only had time for a very brief walk around the Park before heading back to our hotel.



After a brief "pit stop", we were whisked away again. This time by Marilyn Tsolakis, who took us on a quick tour of "Subi" or for non locals, Subiaco. We arrived at Boukla, a very charismatic café run by fellow Castellorizian, Debbie and her husband (Debbie is the sister of Merrill Kostarelas). As soon as I walked in the door, I was immediately reminded of Kastellorizo. We "unexpectedly" ran into and met many Kazzies who passed in and out of the café throughout the day.





Kassie Culture – Dilution or Demise by John Mangos

Earlier this year I was honoured to have been invited to Perth to speak at the Kastellorizian Centenary Celebrations. I was asked to speak in my capacity as the 2008 Kastellorizian of the Year, an award more difficult to get than a Brownlow Medal and quite possibly more prestigious.

I called my paper "Kassie Culture –Dilution" or Demise quite deliberately, there was no question mark after it because it's not an alternative, it's an absolute. I genuinely believe that we either embrace dilution or face the demise of our culture. It was a challenging topic and precipitated some passionate discussion.

I was even challenged, why dilution and not evolution. Because dilution is evolution.

I began with a half serious joke that I used to tell.

When I turned 20 my mother wanted me to marry a Kassie girl,

By the time I was 30 she wanted me to marry a Greek girl,

And by the time I was 40 she was happy if I just married a girl!

It's funny, but it highlights a point I was trying to make. Now that we are third and fourth generation Australian we have to accept dilution as a positive and not a negative, because the alternative is demise.

Haven't we all been through the angst of a member of our family bringing home the Anglo-Australian love interest for the first time? We have reached the point, much to the lament of our grandparents and in some cases parents, where we have to work with this trend and not against it.

And how often have we heard it said: "My daughter married and Australian, but, he's a good boy".

Further, it's a natural follow in the changing complexion of Australian society that each of our generations is becoming more Eurasian. One day soon, if it hasn't happened already, you will see a gorgeous Eurasian child and ask, "Where is your family from?"

"Mum's Chinese and Dad's Greek", may well be the reply.

Kassie Culture - Dilution or Demise by John Mangos

Really, what part of Greece? (Why do we always ask that question?)

"Oh, small island you wouldn't have heard of called Kastellorizo"

Our challenge is to ensure that Eurasian child embraces their Kassie culture as much as their Chinese, Vietnamese, Japanese, Thai or whatever Asian nation their parent is descendant from. How we do that is the hard part.

Thirty years ago when I was a Federal Political correspondent with the Nine Network I travelled to Hong Kong with the then Foreign Minister, Bill Hayden. He had met with the Governor to discuss the handover of Hong Kong to the Chinese, which was still a few years away. He was concerned about the impact it may have on Australia.

In a news conference afterwards, he declared Australia had to accept the fact it was an Asian country and the complexion of Australia would unquestionably begin to become Asian in appearance.

This was front page news here in Australia the next day. White Australia was horrified at the thought. The shock jocks on talkback radio went ballistic. It precipitated a huge political discussion about Australia's immigration policy. Ultimately, however, his prophecy is becoming a reality.

But along that thirty year journey look how much respect and knowledge we have gained about our first Australians, how much more we all now know about Aboriginal culture and tradition.

It's this parallel development that I believe we must follow. But we must be honest in our approach.

We take great pride in saying our forefathers came to Australia early last century and did the jobs the locals didn't want to do. That they assimilated and added value to the fabric of Australian society. And they did.

So why is it some of us are uncomfortable with Albanians on our island doing the jobs the locals don't want to do?

Are they not equally adding to the fabric of that society?

It is hypocritical, self righteous and disingenuous to suggest otherwise.

They too, like our people, have come to a new country from hardship to build a new life for themselves and their families and the first thing they do is learn the language. And when one is speaking of culture and customs the first place to start is the language. Language is the key, the gateway to all cultures.

Of course, we have a subtext here because we have the Greek language and our Kastellorizian dialect. I went on in my talk to give examples of how language has been shown to shape many other domains of thought.

I would have loved to have given my talk in Greek, but like so many of us, victims of our forefathers' anxiety to assimilate quickly, my Greek language skills don't extend to public speaking. So in many ways, the dilution began upon arrival to this country, so shouldn't be wrongly blamed on those whom we choose to marry and breed with outside our Greek or Kassie culture.

I touched on preservation of some of our wonderful cultural idiosyncrasies like the classic "Sabbatovratho", the bride's "trapezi", the songs and proverbs, and the imperative that to achieve such preservation language is essential.

I suggested we need to speak the language of the new generations by creating apps, that the states need to get behind Allan Creswell and support his wonderful work on the genealogy site, that we need to pick our yia-yia's brains (they are walking encyclopaedia and besides who else can teach you to make katoumari), and that if the current tattoo trend continues instead of an ancient zen symbol for peace love and harmony go the heart, cross and anchor.

I don't have the space here to articulate all of my points suffice it to say I know the idea of dilution is unpalatable to some. Especially those who remember and believe, quite rightly, that we withstood occupations in the first and second world wars and still remained proudly Hellenic. But we are now in a diaspora, the mother country is in turmoil, and the times, well ..."they are a changing".

Dear Florence.

I received a copy of the Kazzie news last week, at the same time I was recovering from an operation, and I felt that I would like to write a poem about Kastellorizo, so I drafted one on the same day. I have only been to Kazzie once, way back in 1974 with my family, my wife Georgia, and children, Michael, Nina, and Gary. We left Piraeus together

with your uncle Theo, your grandmother, aunt Florrie, Evelyn, and Fay. Well, it was Easter time, and arriving at Kazzie, we were overcome with its beauty. It still stands out so vividly in my mind starting with the minaret museum, and I know that it's an impossible task to describe it.

However, the poem I have written about it tries to present my feelings, and the birth of our ancestry. The barriers mentioned are many, such as the advent of the steam engine, and the loss of trade by the residents. The scars of war impacted badly on the island, and basically the intestinal fortitude of the residents to withstand these disasters over a long period of time was a credit to them. Notwithstanding all of these hardships, served to strengthen the timbre of the people.

My father's poem to me was written author unknown, and I was told to memorise it which I did, the emphasis being placed on the message it conveyed. I know that I used to get into strife in my teenage years, like most teenagers do, but this wasn't the reason for this poem given to me.

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KAZZIE KERASMA

It is winter! The weather has been the coldest it has been for a few seasons and all I can think about is keeping warm. Sitting by a open fire or heater, sheltered from the rain and the biting Melbourne winds and the grey skies, with the fragrance of a hearty slow cooked meal wafting through the house whilst reading a good book.

In my case the good book is a cookbook of traditional Greek recipes. Flicking through the pages, my mind travels back to my first trip to Greece. It was Christmas time and winter in Greece and my cousin's Andrew and Helen Hadiipetrou took me for a drive to Mt Parnassas. I was so cold, it was the first time I saw or touched snow. Yes imagine that snow in Greece. Eventually we reached what appeared to me to be a little wooden hut. We opened the door and was invited in by the warmth of this charming ski chalet with a pot of mountain tea brewing on the fire place and the smells coming from the kitchen of home cooked hearty stews. Whilst I can't remember what I ate that day, I do remember the warmth and joy of sharing that day with my cousins. I had hope that my travels through my cookbook may have sparked my memory, however I discovered this great recipe for traditional Greek stew made with quince.

I have always thought of this winter fruit to be used in a sweet dish, but this easy recipe made me hungry.

Quince is an interesting fruit, it requires cooking before it can be eaten. And it needs hours of cooking! So it makes it perfect for a slow cooked stew.



Meat Stew with Quince (Kidonato)

Ingredients

150 g butter

- 1.5kg of stewing meat such as chuck stake or lamb or veal.
- 1 onion finely diced
- 1 cup of meat stock (This will depend on the type of meat cooked)
- 1 can of peeled tomatoes

1kg of guinces (about 2-3 depending on the size)

- 1- 2 tablespoons of sugar depending on taste
- 1 cinnamon stick, 5 clove, 5 Juniper berries Salt and pepper

Juice of one lemon.

Method

- 1. Caramelise the onion in a heavy pan (eg Le Creuset) with half (75g) the butter.
- 2. Add meat and cook until lightly browned.
- 3. Pour in half the stock, the tomatoes.
- 4. Add spices and season with salt and pepper.
- 5. Reduce heat, cover and simmer until meat is tender (about 1.5 hrs).
- 6. In the mean time prepare quince as follows:
- 7. Peel, core and cut into bite size pieces.
- 8. Sprinkle with lemon juice to prevent quinces from going brown.
- Melt remaining 75g of butter in a fry pan and add quince
- 10. Cook for 5 minutes or until light brown.
- 11. Add sugar and caramelise.
- 12. Pour in remaining stock and transfer to pan with meat and mix.
- 13. Cover and simmer until quinces are tender.
- 14. Serve with crusty bread and a glass of red wine.



"SAINTLY LIVES" SAINT SOPHIA

Nameday: 17 September Meaning: "Wisdom"


Sophia was a lady of substance, who came from the southern part of Italy. She lived later in Rome, with her 3 daughters "Faith" (Pistis) "Hope" (Elpis) and "Love" (Agapi) and husband. When her husband died, she remained a widow, devoting her time to raising her daughters in a Christian environment.

The four lived at the time of Roman Emperor, Adrianos, who was a persecutor and terminator of Christians (117-138AD.) Adrianos learned of Sophia's family and fervid faith.

In the love of Christianity, Sophia and her daughters suffered interrogation and ultimately death by the persecutors. All three daughters were sent to death first and then Sophia. However, all were true to their faith and beliefs in God, until the end of their earthly lives.

In Istanbul Turkey, "Hagia Sophia" is a great architectural beauty and an important monument both for Byzantine and for Ottoman Empires. Once a Church, later a Mosque and now a Museum for the Turkish Republic. Hagia Sophia is one of the most significant monuments not only in Turkey, but on earth with its architecture and its historical richness.

The Kastellorizian Symbol honours the three core values of Sophia and her daughters: Faith (the cross), Hope (the anchor) and Charity (the heart)

Mary Livery 12.8.1924 – 19.5.2012



Eulogy for Mary Livery written by her three daughters Evelyn, Florence and Georgina.

Our mother's life was based on special relationships. Her warmth, her calm manner, her acceptance of people, her love of conversation and her inquiring mind drew people towards her. She loved to hear about people's lives and share her stories with them. She loved to talk. She loved to listen. So for us, her three daughters, we feel that the best way we can pay tribute to our mother is by describing to you the wonderful relationships she formed throughout her life.

Mary's life began at the 777 Nicholson Street, North Fitzroy fruit shop. When Mary was 6 years old her parents took over the 319 Lygon Street fruit shop. This was the start of a new era for the Conos family – parents Michael and Florrie, Mary and her younger brother Theo. This was the start of 30 years stability, based around the fruit shop and Carlton life and a small Greek Castellorizian community in Carlton.

It may have been the depression years economically but Mary always spoke of the emotional advantages.

Imagine a good half of a large brood of first cousins (from both sides) living close by, within a block of the fruit shop and the other half, a short tram ride way. What a wonderful community Mary was a part of in those years. Male and female cousins just around every corner. Some were girlfriend-cousins, like the Jackomos girls - Mary, Stella and Maisie. Others, she took on the older cousin role - for Jackie, Elaine & Chrissie. Many others were just a natural part of Mary's daily life - the Jackomos boys, the Gillavis and Brondou crew, Uncle Manuel's family, Uncle Peter's family, Mihalakina's family, the old Uncle Theo, Auntie Rosie's family and a bit further down the tram track the Constance family. The cousins were her life - she loved them all and stayed in contact with them throughout her life.

Michael Conos, Mary's father died in 1944. A gentle man and even though we never met him she always told us what an influence he had on her life. We have always imagined Mum's personality was an exact replica of her father's. Florrie, her mother, was a true Augustes woman - very loving, reliable, hard working and provided continuity for Mary and Theo. Mary was always fond of her brother Theo, but when her father died the bond grew even greater. Florrie, Mary and Theo persevered with the fruit shop, Theo effectively running it, doing the 1am markets from when he was 16, with Mary and Florrie as support. This unconditional love for her brother was confirmed here. She loved him like no other sibling can love another, (even more so when Florrie died in 1979.)

And then along came Pino, the love of her life. 1951 and married life began in Canning Street, North Carlton. Mum loved Dad from the day she met him and never stopped loving him. Pino was a very determined and stubborn young man, with a great passion for life and Mum loved him for it. Like many of her cousins, Mary and Pino started married life in North Carlton where daughters, Evelyn and Florence were born. The cousins were still very close by.

The late 1950s saw the family move east, the housing commission were moving in and they all got scared.

Growing up in the 1960s in Blackburn North was a wonderful time. Along came our Georgina, Nana was now living with us and Uncle Theo and Auntie Jan, Michael and Faye were just around the corner. Neighbours and friends everywhere, and distance was no obstacle to keeping up with all of the cousins. This did not change when we went to Box Hill North. The Conos's went to Chadstone, now with Peter and Susan but we were still together all of the time —

weekly dinners, birthdays, Easter, Christmas, music lessons, swimming lessons, holidays – great times.

Mum always worked. By Dad's side, she was always at the shops. To begin with - the fruit shops, then the milkbars, the coffee shops and the last one, the Chocolate shop. Despite the dreadful illnesses Mum experienced throughout her life she still got up and kept working, keeping the family strong — even if at times that meant two hours on public transport either way. She was determined to send us to private school and once when she was experiencing one of her serious Lupus attacks she made Dad promise, no matter what, that the girls were to stay enrolled at MLC.

By the mid 80s Mum had lost sight in both eyes and Pino became her right arm. But that was okay. It never stopped her from doing what she wanted – she just made lots of mistakes and was the first to laugh about them. When she went to flip the fried egg she could not find it; it was not in the frypan but sitting on the stove top. Remember those jigsaw puzzles that she had out every night – she made those pieces fit whether they wanted to or not. Remember the time she told Florence off for crying when the dog lost an eye. "But you never cried when I lost my sight!" she said.

In 1985 Mary and Pino retired and they fell in love again. These were great years for Mary's children and grandchildren to be a part of. Mum thrived on Pino's retirement hobbies but also had time to do her own things. Somehow or other she got to the Greek Church Op Shop three times a week, (how she sorted those clothes we will never know) and volunteered at the Greek Doncaster Nursing Home, the Box Hill Greek Elderly Citizens Club and the Box Hill Greek Church Women's Auxiliary.

Mary's sense of family never changed. She went from Mother to Grandmother and Great Aunt and loved every minute of it. She kept on loving her family and Perth was no obstacle. Pino's death in 1996 devastated her and she was never quite the same but tried to shield us from her terrible grief. The Perth trips slowly wound down, the letters by now could not be written but the phone calls never stopped. Evelyn and Mum were like two little old ladies on the phone, talking for hours about everyone and everything.

She was our mother always. Even up until last week Gina knew that when Mum called her Georgina, she had done something wrong. Florence was still trying to master the Greek rissoles to Mum's satisfaction and Evelyn was still being offered friendly parental advice.

We need to thank many people in Mary's life – the many who formed such wonderful relationships with her

We thank the Karana community for giving Mum four happy and caring years.

Her phone became her lifeline. She continued her friendships with family and friends through her phone calls - to Chrissie, Daisy, Ina, Stella, Elaine, Sylvie, Win, Renie, Mosca, Maria, Pam, Hannah, Peggy and Betty. We thank you.

To cousin Maisie – a special friend and cousin who visited Mum nearly every week after Dad died. We thank you.

To her special nieces and nephews – Michael (her godson) and Janet, Faye, Peter Susan and Lisa.

To her cousins, she loved you all – the Jackomos, Augustes, Xanthos, Pavles, Gilavis, Brondou, Platis and Kios families.

To Auntie Jan – Mum's best friend whom she loved dearly.

Her beloved Theo – the brother she adored.

She loved being Nana to Andrew, Brett, Kathryn and Matthew. Her face would light up every time she saw them or heard about their latest experiences.

To Bevan and Tony, Mum appreciated your time, patience and love.

As Auntie Stella said to Florence on the phone yesterday:

"You don't forget good people. You always love them forever. You may not see them that often but good people stay with you."


There are many of you here today whom we may not have mentioned who knew Mum or knew of her. Thank you all for paying your respects.

The Man

Michael was highly intelligent, had a sharp mind, good natured, honest and always popular with his family and friends. He was a man of his word and a genuine good bloke.

The Family

Michael was born in Darwin, Northern Territory on the 19th March 1922, the third child of George and Christina (nee Kailis) Kyriakos. His father migrated to Australia in 1911 and his mother 1918. They married in Darwin, Northern Territory in 1919.

Michael was dearly loved and well respected by each of his siblings and he had a special and unique relationship with all of them. Michael was the brother of Mary Adgemis (deceased), Jack Kyros (dec), Evangelia (dec), Evelyn Karis, Eve Peters, Herb Kyriakos and John Kyriakos (dec). He was the loved brother-in-law of their respective partners Economos (dec), Kath (dec), Bill (dec), Harry (dec), Maria and Zeffie. He was also loved brother-in-law of Con (dec) and Shirley Koutsoukis, Lily and Peter (dec) Peters, Marika and Jack Bisas. He was loved 'Uncle Mick' to many nieces and nephews. And the proud godfather of Margaret Moraitis, her son Harley and Leah Kouloumbrakis.

Upbringing

From Darwin the family moved to Perth in 1926 where he attended Highgate Hill Primary and then Perth Boys High.

Growing up as a child through the depression there were many hard times, as work was scarce. He would help his father peddle their fruit barrow after school and on weekends.

In 1938, with the mining boom in Kalgoorlie, Michael, his father & older brother Jack moved there for work, with the rest of the family joining them in 1939. There, Michael worked in restaurants to help provide for family, which provided a foundation for his future endeavours in the restaurant business.

<u>Army</u>

Michael joined the Army in the Infantry division in November 1941. He served in Onslow, North West Australia and completed special jungle training in Cunangra, Queensland. He was first stationed in Bouganville, Solomon Islands where they took over from the Americans. He then went on to serve in Rabaul, New Britain and Port Moresby in Papua New Guinea. He proudly served in the Army until March 1946.

Marriage

In 1946, Michael followed his heart and travelled to Melbourne, where he met Nina Koutsoukis. Michael's mother overwhelmingly approved of this decision. At the same time he commenced work in the hospitality industry at the Savoy Hotel and the Victoria Coffee Palace located behind the Melbourne Town Hall.

Michael and Nina married on the 19 January 1947 and were happily married for 65 years and shared a wonderful long life together with love and company. Between 1947-1952 Michael and Nina lived with her parents, George and Eva Koutsoukis at 423 Glenferrie Road, Hawthorn

In 1952, they purchased their family home at 20 Hambledon Rd, Hawthorn, where he and Nina have lived for 60 years. They had three daughters, Christine, Vivien and Gina, where they all shared wonderful experiences growing up throughout the years. He encouraged his daughters in education, in their careers, in work and to pursue their dreams. There were many happy family occasions but a particular highlight was Michael's legendary name days filled with singing, dancing and the banquet table.

Work

In 1947, Michael together with Nina's brother Con Koutsoukis went into business partnership in the Jolly Roger Restaurant. They developed the business by purchasing the adjoining paper shop and grocery store, so that they could extend the restaurant and create a take away area and also acquire a BYO licence. It was the first Melbourne restaurant in St Kilda Road. With his wife's assistance they were hosts over the years to tens of thousands of satisfied customers from all walks of life, for instance celebrities from the early years of television, identities from the racing fraternity, office workers, school children and of course, Michael's friends. They ran the restaurant for 38 years, it became a landmark in Melbourne. It was a meeting place for everyone, filled with happy and cherished memories. Michael and Nina spent a majority of their married life together working side by side at the Jolly Roger.

Michael was an active man and after a short retirement in 1985 he sought out work again. In 1987 he worked in a number of hotels and at the Canterbury Day Care. His final workplace was at St Paschals for the Franciscan Friars, where he worked for a decade from 1992-2002. The friars became respected and close friends and held Michael in high esteem.

Interests

Michael was a one eyed Collingwood football supporter all his life, despite the numerous hardships associated with being a Pies supporter.

He was an outstanding card player due to his exceptional memory and was the Best Solo player at the Leskie (Club).

He loved horse racing and he went into partnership with friends, owning a number of race horses between 1965 and 1980.

He was well liked within the racing fraternity - so much so, the T.A.B. Chairman asked him to cater for the very First Fashions of the Field on Melbourne Cup Day, Flemington Spring Racing Carnival in 1970.

Family

He was a great role model for his children and his grandchildren.

His three daughters Christine, Vivien and Gina have relied on Michael at different times of their lives and he has always been there for them. Family came first as he had a strong value system and strong sense of duty to family. The girls were included in his hobbies and pursuits, including many fun times. However, there were sad times as well, with the death of his daughter Vivien a particularly hard time.

He was respected and highly regarded by his son-inlaw, Con Gekas.

He had four wonderful grandchildren, Linda and Stanley Christofas and Michael and Katherine Gekas, who all adored him. He was extremely proud of each of them and their achievements in attaining tertiary education and graduating from University. He had a unique relationship with his grandchildren, who turned to him for advice or looked to him as a role model in their own lives.

He was proud of both his Greek Heritage, of a Castellorizian background, and to be an Australian. He was a respected trustee of the Castellorizian club. He could socialize with anyone, never being out of place with the Greeks or the Aussies. In the Greek clubs, he was affectionately known as Australian Mick.

Michael was much loved and highly regarded by a vast network of extended family and lifelong friends, past and present. Michael was respected for his integrity, strength of character, loyalty, good nature and sense of humour.

He was popular amongst his peers, as people found him interesting and great company. People would gravitate towards this affectionate, sociable man. He had excellent historical memory and always had a story to tell.

He was hardworking, had a strong work ethic, strong value system and a generous family man. We will cherish the memories of this good man.

Michael, your family will miss you deeply, your love, company and humour.
