## 2012 Kastellorizian of the Year Mr. Michael N. Spartels



The Kastellorizian of the Year Award was established in 1993 to give recognition to distinguished members of the Kastellorizian Community within Victoria and Australia and has included many eminent men and women as listed on our honour board, who have made an outstanding contribution to life in Australia and brought honour to the Kastellorizian heritage.

Each year the Kastellorizian of the Year Committee is faced with the difficult task of selecting the Kastellorizian of the Year from the numerous nominations that are received. It is with great pleasure that the Selection Committee announces that the 2012 Kastellorizian of the Year Award is to be awarded to **Mr. Michael N. Spartels** 

Many members in Victoria will be aware of Michael's commitment to the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria which spans nearly four decades of distinguished service. During this time Michael participated in the many events, served and supported the Association on numerous committees, along with renovating and maintaining the clubrooms. He has helped to propelled the Association into the position that it is in today.

Michael has served as President of the Association several times. One of Michael's achievements during his last term in 2008-10, was directed towards preserving the heritage of the members and the Association. Under his leadership the Multicultural Commission of Victoria awarded the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria a grant of \$9,000 to enable the organisation to properly manage, document and store the collection of the club and develop a set of polices to ensure that future collections would be managed appropriately. By developing a serious approach to the management of the Association's heritage, members past, present and future will be able to access materials that will enable them to understand their Kastellorizian heritage and feel proud to be a member of the Association. The success obtained from the Multicultural Commission grant was instrumental in helping the Association to secure a further grant of \$4,400 from the National Library of Australia to conduct a "Significant Assessment" of the clubs collection. These funds will assist the Association to continue to manage the collection at a level closer to a museum standard. A project which is on going today.

Michael's passion included promoting the activities of the Association to the senior members of the community as well as supporting a program for the younger members to participate in. He encouraged younger members to attend the Association functions and to participate at all levels of the Association and in particular, to serve on the committee. Michael was always available to give younger and less experienced committee members advice and encouragement. It is also clear that his love of his Kastellorizian heritage has been extended to his children and grandchildren, as they actively participate activities and committee of the Association.

Michael's support and generosity also extends to the Greek and wider Australian communities.

Michael organised and supervised the construction of the Manse at the rear of "St. Eustathios" Greek Orthodox Church, in Dorcas Street, South Melbourne This project was a significant and long term commitment generating a major construction of the church which houses the offices of the Bishop and it is regularly used by members of the Greek community.

As a youth, Michael played for the thirds with the Carlton Football Club, which has resulted in a long time commitment and love for the Carlton football team. He went on to coach junior football and served on the committee for ten years. In later years, Michael became Social Club Director and Vice President. As a result of his commitment to the Carlton Football Club, Michael was recognised with the titles of Life Member of the Carlton Cricket Club and the Carlton Football Social Club.

In 2010, Michael was nominated for City of Port Phillip Seniors Award.

Throughout these achievements, Michael has had the support of his loving family. His wife, Dianne supported Michael in his endeavours. Dianne has also been participant in the club's activities and was a former member of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria Committee in her own right. She has been valuable asset to Michael and their children and grandchildren.

### 2012 Kastellorizian Youth Achievement Award

It is with great pleasure that the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria (KAV) announces **Kristen Mihalos** as this year's recipient of the Kastellorizian Youth Achievement Award.

Kristen has been recognised for her deeds in the area of community service and her achievements in the performing arts. Over the last 5 years Kristen has been an active member of Amnesty International. She has also hosted a Pink Ribbon Breakfast where she single-handedly raised over \$800 for the cause. Whilst in Year 12 she performed in the Ivanhoe Girls Benefit Concert to raise funds for Frontyard Youth Services. Kristen was also on the organising committee of this event which raised \$46,000.

Kristen's other achievement is in the area of the performing arts. During her Year 11 studies in 2010, Kristen performed as Asaka, the main character in the musical *Once on this Island* in the Young Australian Broadway Chorus production at the Adelaide Fringe Festival.

Last year whilst in year 12, Kristen was a Prefect at Ivanhoe Grammar School. In her role as Prefect, Kristen offered assistance to the school community and provided peer support. Whilst studying VCE, she was invited to audition for the 2011 Top Class Season of Excellence and achieved full marks in her self-choreographed Year 12 Dances. Kristen completed VCE and achieved an ATAR score of 94.35, with scores of over 40 in English, Dance and French. Also in 2011, Kristen completed the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award.

At the beginning of this year, Kristen participated in the Melbourne premier of the musical *Spring Awakening* at the National Theatre. At present Kristen is teaching dance for the Young Australian Broadway Chorus and choreographed the 2012 Ivanhoe Girls Grammar School musical production of *Sweet Charity*. Kristen is also studying at Monash University.

#### Audio-visual upgrade

Over the last 18 months, many of you would have visited or read about the upgrading of our clubrooms. We have successfully completed two of the three proposed stages of the facilities upgrade.

One area of improvement on the "to do" list was to upgrade the audio-visual facilities in order to provide state of the art facilities for conferences, talks and presentations, as well as general entertainment for members of the KAV. At last year's AGM, members were given the opportunity to put forward their views on what audio-visual system they thought the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria's clubrooms required. The members listened to the pros and cons of purchasing a data projector system or one of the top of the range TV with presentation and entertainment capabilities. They then shared their views with the Committee of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria and the general consensus favoured the TV system.

At a recent Kastellorizian Association of Victoria's committee meeting, the Committee weighed up the suggestions presented by the members, and along with the Committee's research, the Committee decided to purchase a *state of the art* TV with audiovisual-presentation functions on behalf of the Association.

Nik Spartels and John Karis researched the purchase of a flat screen LED TV which has 3D options, audio connections along with presentation capabilities via hook up to our computer. The TV is also able to play DVDs via the DVD player. The additional feature of this system is the "conference calling" facilities through Skype, via the internet. This will provide the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria with the possibility of holding long distance conferences and time zone permitting making direct and audio-visual contact with friends on Kastellorizo. The installation, cables and labour costs of the TVs were donated by the Spartels family.

As shown in the photograph on the top of the right hand column, the TV-AV system compliments and adds further function to our recently renovated clubrooms. The Kastellorizian Association of Victoria welcomes all members to attend our functions and to enjoy our invigorated facilities.

## Kastellorizian Association of Victoria Preservation of our cultural history

#### **Historical News - Community Heritage Grant**

In early November 2011, I was most fortunate to be able to represent the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria at the 2011 Community Heritage Grants – Preservation and Collection Management Training Workshops, organised by the National Library of Australia in Canberra. The association was extended this invitation because of its success in being awarded a Federal Government grant for a Significant Assessment of its historical collection.

For the coming year, Community History Grants worth \$408,000 have been distributed to 82 community groups and organizations from around Australia to assist in the identification and preservation of community owned but nationally significant heritage collections.

This grant is important in supporting the effort to preserve the Kastellorizian collection grassroots level. Whilst the grant will provide the funds for a significant assessment to be carried out by an appropriately qualified and experienced historian, the workshops offered training to a community representative to assist in protecting the collection and making it accessible while it remains in the local context, and in doing so, gain a degree of expertise to act and follow-up on the Assessor's report. To ensure this, community representatives taken through а three-day preservation and collection management workshop. For someone like me, who for over 20 years has maintained a keen interest in community and family history, this was "the "experience of a lifetime."

The conference was superbly organized. It included a rich and diverse series of workshops and lectures. It also ensured situations arose where participants could network with experts and authorities in the archival management and preservation fields. Meeting fellow participants was also very stimulating. The workshops covered a vast array of topics, all centred on the themes of collection management, collection significance, preservation, access and recording of history. Workshops were held at a range of locations including the National Library of Australia, the National Archives of Australia, the National Film and Sound Archive and National Museum Australia. This guaranteed participants could directly see and hear what the experts "say and do."

#### **Preparing for a Significant Assessment**

In preparation for the Significant Assessment I have been visiting the clubrooms each Monday to familiarize myself with the historical collection. I am indebted to Nicholas and Marie Zorbas for making this task so much easier for me. Over many, many months last year, in a voluntarily capacity they comprehensively archived 21 boxes of documents containing 150 folders into categories Because of their huge effort the accessibility. documents are now archived, stored safely in a systematic way and easily identifiable in their boxes, ensuring that the growth of our archives in years to come should be a relatively simple process. Nicholas and Marie also carried out a preliminary assessment of artefacts and textiles. (For a full copy of the Cultural Report written by Nicholas Zorbas, see the 2010-2011 KAV Annual Report).

For a successful Significant Assessment the club is required to "talk to the collection before the assessor." What is important and unique about our collection? What is the story behind the key items in our collection?" This will firstly involve the identification of significant items within the collection. This could be, for example, past minutes of early Committee meetings (some in Greek). correspondence regarding sporting events from the Young Men's Kazzie Club or the Ladies' Society election results. Research needs to be carried out about our key items so we can appreciate what makes our collection unique. What is the story behind the briefcase, the costume? What does our collection of Kazzie News symbolize? As I am familiarizing myself with the collection, I am trying to identify significant items with a view to researching them early in the new year.

#### The Assessment

The Assessor will make a 2-3 day on-site visit followed by 4-5 days writing up the report. At the site visit the Assessor needs to examine and assess the collection, looking at the provenance of the items (story behind them), the physical condition, associated documentation, storage and display. A report will follow making recommendations for the management and preservation of our historical collection.

The club is in the process of appointing a suitably qualified and experienced assessor, one who is familiar and has recent experience with the Significant Assessment process. It is crucial that the assessment follows the National Library of Australia endorsed methodology if we wish to apply for future funding, particularly for preservation needs.

## Whilst we move through the Significant Assessment process the club is also very keen to enhance its historical document collection:

Gaps in the collection. As Nicholas Zorbas noted in his report to the 2011 Annual General Meeting, "Unfortunately, no documents prior to 1950 and very few prior to 1960 have been found. There are also large time gaps in some of the documents that have been found. It is assumed that many documents have been lost over the years, or if they still exist, are held in private houses, attics or garages." The association urges all members, particularly past committee members to please check their sheds, boxes, home storage areas etc. Whether it be a single document, files or boxes, please contact me and I will collect it. I also encourage you to not sort the documents, to keep them as they are. Documents are best kept in their context. Documents are also best kept in their entirety, no matter how trivial you think they may be. E.g. a thank-you card may well be extremely significant in the context of other documents in a file. This all adds to the provenance of the items. Do you have any correspondence from the club? Any fliers from events of days gone by? Any thank-you cards? These items maybe from 50 years ago or less than 10 years ago.

The Kazzie News. Do you have any old copies of the Kazzie News? In particular we are missing the following

1984 (14 & 19), 1986 (36 & 37), 1987 (44, 47), 1989 (62) and 1995 (95). Also, we do not have any copies of the earlier newsletters which the club distributed before the Kazzie News was revived in 1983.

Whilst the historical collection is important in its own right, it is only with a comprehensive collection and allowing access to it, (such as for display and exhibition or research purposes), can we ensure that the history of Kastellorizians in Victoria is recorded, comes alive and stays alive for future generations.

## Kastellorizian Association of Victoria Preservation of our cultural history

We need to remind ourselves that the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria and its members have played a very important role in the cultural heritage of the state of Victoria and of the nation.

Finally, I wish to personally thank Yvonne Panagacos and Connie Gregory who had the foresight to apply for the Significant Assessment Grant. Their successful application has ensured that the club has prioritised the process of preserving its history and in doing so, secured the place of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria in the national distribution of Australia's history.

Please contact me if you would like to volunteer some of your time and support the club in its historical endeavours. This may include anything from translating documents, managing and preserving the archives, collecting historical material, organizing access of the collection, researching, recording and publishing our Kastellorizian history or assisting in displays and events.

Proposal to name the Historical Society of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria - 'Horafia' by Florence Livery.

Over the recent summer vacation I went through the

many journals of my late father, Panos Livery. In the journal of his trip to Castellorizo, in 1985, Dad made sporadic mention of the area called the 'Horafia.' One such entry, dated 27/9/1985, 'I met Basil Hondros and his daughter, Nina in the Horafia." "The Horafia is a funny place — ruins, good houses, renovated houses, empty houses, trees and a few little gardens, and even goats penned up; fruit trees, pomegranates and the greenest part of Castellorizo.' Entries like this made me start to think about the Horafia. What was it? I then turned to our expert historian, Nicholas Pappas and posted a question on his website, asking if anyone knew about the history of this area known as the Horafia.

Nicholas replied, 'The area known as the **Horafia** was originally just that - 'horafia' or fields where limited agriculture was undertaken. This was in the 18th century, when the town extended only halfway along the promontory known as Kavos. At this time, the only church in this area was the small church of Panaghia which today sits beside the church of St Spyridon in the square.

During this period, the island's cemetery was also located here (ie beyond the outskirts of the urbanised area) and it remained here until the end of the 19th century when a decision was taken, due to overcrowding, to re-locate it to the Niftis promontory. The more recent graves were moved to the new site, but most of the remains were re-interred in the ostothyke (ossuary) which is to be found at the rear of the church of St George (Ayios Yeorgios 'tou Louka' or 'tou Horafiou').

From the end of the Greek revolution, and starting with the construction of the Cathedral of Sts Constantine & Helen, the Horafia precinct became integrated into the town, and later construction, which included the boys and girls schools and the St George church, turned the area into a social, religious and educational hub for the islanders, a far cry from its long-forgotten agricultural role, or even its function as the site of the island's cemetery. Photos from the 1920s and 1930s, in particular, regularly show the islanders reveling in the square formed by these civic additions and the square has retained this civic function to this day.'

From the changing use of the Horafia from a place of agriculture, to a cemetery, to a social, religious and educational hub I instantly drew in my mind a parallel to our Australian pioneer Kazzies and their descendants. From humble beginnings a century ago, prevailed by hard labour and menial employment, Victorian Kazzies have evolved and forged their way across all elements Australian society, institutions, professions. businesses and pursuits. We have revelled in Australian society yet at the same time we want our story to be told, the story of our homeland and our newland. We want to tell our story both to fellow Kazzies and the wider Australian community. Victorian Kazzies have an incredible amount of communal and individual wisdom, knowledge and experience to share. Maybe we will not be sharing it by communicating over coffee at the tables and chairs at the Horafia on Castellorizo. Hopefully, we will be sharing it through the pages and projects of our Horafia.


## Kastellorizian Association of Vic Membership Report

As of 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2012, the Kastellorizian Association had 395 recorded entries on its mailing list. Figure 1 shows the percentages for members and non-members based on our mailing lists and registers.

A total of 270 members are eligible to vote which represents 68% of our member and registration lists. This percentage has increased significantly since last year which is due primarily to a large increase in Honorary members. The Financial and non-financial numbers are consistent with other years.

**Note:** The Membership subscription fee reverted back to \$10 per person for members in the 18 to 64 years bracket, as per the AGM.

#### **Website Report**

By John Karis

The new website came into effect on the 11<sup>th</sup> November 2011. The information provided in this report relates to the period from this date to the 22<sup>nd</sup> March, when the data was collated.

#### Website performance

Visitors: Last month the number of visitors to the site was approximately 500. This is under the annual average, however, it includes the festive season at which time activity normally tapers off. (This does not include multiple hits)

Most visited pages in order: Home, Gallery, Travel, Greek Orthodox Calendar, Newsletters and Genealogy

Source: 72% from Search Engines, 12% Direct (decrease in Search Engines and increase in Direct traffic)

Major countries: Australia, USA, Greece and UK

The average time spent on site was 2.5 minutes

The bounce rate was 51%. This reflects a decrease which suggests visitors are finding the information they are searching for)

New Visitors: 72%

Pages visited: 3.13 pages per visitor (increase)

#### Observations

The traffic to our website is quite seasonal in that Genealogy is usually further up the top in the most pages visited. However, with Easter coming up there is always a large increase in visitors to the calendar pages to access information on dates and name days etc.

Greece has stabilised in 3<sup>rd</sup> place, in relation to countries of origin, after previous months of variability.

Although traffic is down on the annual average there are significant achievements such as: people are staying logged on longer and coming straight to the site, compared with previous years where they would search by Kastellorizo or keyword. This means we are becoming more well known.

#### Content

This is an integral component of what makes a good website. We are still making changes to the Recipes, Culture and Newsletter pages in order to make it easier to navigate and store information. For example, the Newsletters section will soon include an archive folder for past editions, which will be password protected, and recipes will have folders based on food type ie. savoury, desserts etc.

#### Facebook

We amended our Kastellorizian Association of Victoria 'Facebook Page' by adding the word (Australia). It was considered that we needed to be more universal and appeal to a wider audience. The new website now also has a clearly visible Facebook tab so this should attract more visitors in time.

We reported last year that we were disappointed that our Facebook page was not receiving a great deal of traffic with most of the notifications and postings emanating from the more mature members and visitors. It now appears that we are increasing our visibility and have a considerable number of new visitors coming to our page.

To exemplify this we have provided some "insights' into our visitors' demographics:

- The most number of visitors are female with 67% compared with males at 33%
- The female age bracket is 25 to 44 years and the male 25 to 34 years. This could be considered unusual for young males to be interested in our page. We will continue to track this aspect.
- The countries of origin in order of activity are: Australia, Greece, USA, Italy, UK, Sweden and Cyprus. A good mix of destinations and we are pleased to see Greece being so prominent, which is mainly attributable to visitors wanting to announce Kastellorizian-related events and activities.

If you haven't visited our Facebook page as yet then I urge you to do so and, by all means, make a comment or post some information which you feel would be of interest to all Kastellorizians around the globe.

It would be appreciated if you could also make your children aware of the page as they could communicate/chat with their own friends and family.



#### My Travels to Zambia, Botswana and Namibia.

On Saturday the 26th of November 2010, eight Ruyton students, two teachers, one World Challenge leader and myself set off on our four week expedition to Africa. Saying goodbye to our family and friends, we were left with many mixed emotions and the feeling of uncertainty as we were not sure what to expect for the four-weeks ahead.

After a long, 26 hour plane journey we finally arrived in Zambia. We were greeted with our 'moving home for the next four weeks' - a safari truck and its driver Simba! Stepping out of the tiny airport the heat was over 40 degrees and this was average weather for Zambia at this time of year. That night there was a huge thunderstorm; sleeping in tents, the thunder sounded a lot closer. The next day we made it to Victoria Falls, which was incredible. I was amazed that the falls was a border for five countries - Nambia, Botswana, Zambia, Angola and Zimbabwe.

Before long we were back on the road and heading for Botswana, this is where we did our acclimatisation trek, which was very scary as we travelled along the 'Okavango Delta' on wood boats similar to canoes but hand made and called 'Mokoros'. As we set off along the river our trek guide had forgotten to tell us that the water was home to many crocodiles and hippopotamuii, which sent the whole group into a frenzy. Making it to our camp alive, we set up our tents and went on a walking safari where we saw the 'Big 5' - Lion, Elephant, Buffalo, Leopard and Rhinoceros which was very exciting.

The next stop was Namibia which took a two whole days of travelling. We drove though the desert, seeing an animal on the odd occasion but we were all very relived to arrive at our project phase destination - Waterberg Primary School.

The primary school relies on donations and volunteers in order to continue educating Namibian children, from grades 1-7. As we arrived at the school we were introduced to the Principal, Mrs Adelaide, who presented us with our tasks for the week. These involved repainting classrooms, building

a carpark for staff, designing and creating a sign for the school and planting various flowers and vegetables.

On our first day we were faced with the challenge of purchasing all the required equipment with the money we'd fundraised throughout the year. As we were in a remote area we had to travel over an hour to Otjiwarango where we spent a tiring and stressful day finding materials and bargaining for the best prices. Throughout the week we found ourselves digging trenches, mixing cement, laying bricks, knocking down walls, painting classrooms, doing heavy lifting and many other tasks we weren't accustomed to. the blistering heat, we successfully accomplished all of our tasks and during the process gained many rewarding skills. Along the way we were fortunate enough to meet many students from the school; this was an extremely eye opening experience and made us realise how much a week of work would benefit them, their school and the community.

With our remaining money and donations we were also able to provide the children with netballs, soccer balls, footballs, pencils, crayons, sharpeners and various other goods. Although at times it seemed as though we would never finish, with the help of friendly locals and the continuous determination and support from each other, we managed to pull through and achieve all of our goals. Together we completed a project which could seem almost impossible for a group of nine Ruyton school girls and two awesome teachers. On our last day we said our goodbyes and left the Waterberg community with pride and something for the kids to always remember us by. This experience was unforgettable, as we were able to benefit the community as well as ourselves and take home a lifetime of memories.

#### Saints Constantine and Helen

21 May (Our Patron Saints)

Constantine The Great (Equal of the Apostles) is the first Roman Emperor to accept Christianity. The Latin meaning of the name is "firm and faithful." The English meaning "constant."

Constantine's mother, Helen, means "light." Helen is closely associated in the discovery of the "wood of life", the true cross, which was the All-Holy Cross of our Sovereign Lord.

In the Orthodox Church, both Mother and Son are memorialised on 21st May.

Constantine was born in 274 A.D. in Serbia. His father was Constantine The First King of the vicinity. Helen was from Asia Minor. As in her name, she was "Hellenic" in descent and married Constantine prior to him becoming King, at the age of 23. Constantine The Great became a general when his father died and thereafter became King Constantine Junior by the army. In his reign, Constantine had a love for Christianty and for the Christian people. Towards the Church, he abolished crucifixion, working on punishments Sundays and issued towards blasphemers. Constantine put an end to duel fighting and freed the of slaves in order to cease being abused. He offered financial support to the poor, to those with many children and to the disabled.

Towards the later years of his extraordinary life, Constantine's empire had Greece as it's epicentre known as the "Hellenic Byzantine Empire." The capital city was named, "Constantinople" by the fathers of the First Ecumenical Council. In 337 A.D., when Great Constantine became ill, he asked to be baptized a Christian and thereafter did not wear his robes again until his death.

The Icon of Mother and Son shows the holding of the Cross and Nails with both wearing Crowns of Sovereignty.

In Kastellorizo, the Church "St Constantine and St Helen" is picturesque and grand to see. In Melbourne (South Yarra), the Church "St Constantine and St Helen" sees the celebration of it's Nameday with respect and honour for the Kastellorizian people.

"Xpovia Polla" to our Patron Saints and may we all be proud of our origins!!!

In August last year, a book launch for the first novel by Kastellorizian descendant Phil Kafcaloudes was held at Readings in Carlton. The novel was based on his Grandmother's involvement in WW2. Following it's launch, the book received good reviews in the *Neos Kosmos* (http://neoskosmos.com/news/en/someone-elses-war-review) and *The Daily Telegraph*. Phil contacted the KAV and gave us the following synopsis: "I am a radio and TV presenter with the ABC of proud Kastellorizo descent. Even though I am Melbourne-based, the book, Someone Else's War, has been embraced by the Greek community in Sydney. It was launched by former premier Bob Carr, and then there were special receptions at AHEPA, and at a Hellenic Society reception at the war memorial in Hyde Park to mark Oxi Day, 2011. The novel was also featured at a function for the Greek Orthodox community the next day. I would love to share this story with the Kassie community in Melbourne. Although the story is mostly taken up with my grandmother's fights against the Nazi's, I also tell the story of my grandfather's trip from Kastellorizo to San Francisco in 1906 and (on the other side of the family) my Dad's rescue from Kastellorizo as a refugee baby during WW1."

## **KAZZIE KERASMA**

Kazzies and their descendents are firmly entrenched into the DNA of Australia's history. In this edition of the *Kazzie News*, again I deviate from our traditional Kazzie Kerasma and bring you a recipe from our Australian table. As we have highlighted Phil's book, Someone Else's War and are supporting a seminar on Greeks (including Kazzies) who served in the Australian Armed Forces and with ANZAC Day approaching, my recipe selection for this edition is for **ANZAC Biscuits.** 

A quick scan of the literature suggests the usual Australian/New Zealand rivalry with regards to who can claim the fame as the originator of the recipe. But it is greatly acknowledged that the Australian Country Women's Association recipe is *bona fide*.

- This is my recipe for **ANZAC Biscuits** from my school days.
- In a large bowl, combine: 1 cup plain flour; 1 cup sugar; 1 cup rolled oats; 1 cup desiccated coconut.
- In a small saucepan over a medium heat combine 4 oz butter and 1 tablespoon golden syrup
- In a small bowl, combine 2 tablespoons boiling water and 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda and add to the melted butter and Golden Syrup.
- Add in dry ingredients and add a teaspoonful of the biscuit mixture onto the greased baking tray and bake at 180°C (or approx 375 °F) for 12 minutes, or until golden brown.Cool and enjoy!

100th Birthday





## Stephen D. Paltos [Paltoglou]

Born: 25<sup>th</sup> October, 1911 Died: 27<sup>th</sup> November, 2011

Age: 100



Stephen Paltoglou was born on the island of Kastellorizo, Greece. His father was Dimitrios Paltoglou and his mother was Irene Amonis. He was the eldest of seven siblings. His brothers were Peter and Bill [both deceased]. His sisters Maria, Anna, Cherry [all deceased], with Betty being the remaining sibling.

In 1928, at the age of 17, Stephen came to Australia [on a boat called the 'Villdamiens']. He travelled with his best friend Mick Lucas, who later married his sister Cherry. The journey from Port Said, Egypt took 35 days, across turbulent seas. On three occasions they were told to put on their life jackets. Could you imagine that!

Stephen stayed initially with his Uncle Mick Mangos and his mother's sister Aunty Tassia Mangos. In 1928 work was scarce but he foraged jobs in cafes and fruit shops.

Shortly after he arrived, he arranged for his father Dimitrios to come from Kastellorizo, financed by borrowings from a money lender introduced by his Uncle Mick Mangos. At the beginning of the depression in 1929 gaining employment was difficult. They travelled together to Mildura picking grapes and tomatoes. In 1932, due to the scarcity of work, his father Dimitrios returned to Kastellorizo. In 1934 Stephen arranged for his father to return to Australia for the second time.

In 1935 Stephen opened his own business at 230 Carlisle Street, St. Kilda. It was called 'The Oyster Cafe'. It was a very successful business and unique for the times. Stephen arranged for an out of work American artist, [in return for food and board], to paint three magnificent murals on the walls of the cafe. Mural of the Acropolis, the Shrine [Melbourne], Milne Bay [U.S.A.] and Port Moresby [P.N.G]. Draped over the kitchen entrance were large painted flags of Greece and Australia. This cafe/shop was the lifeblood of the Paltoglou family for many years and laid a foundation from which all the family benefited.

Between 1936/1937 Stephen brought out his mother and his siblings. He arranged the marrying of his sisters, with obvious monetary and dowry obligations. [He was the 'captain cook' of his family].

In 1943 he met his future father-in-law Peter Mavris [in Sydney] and his daughter Ann whom after a short courtship he married in 1943.

He and his wife Ann were a great team working hard in their business and rearing three children, Irene, Jim and Christine. In 1959 he moved from 230 Carlisle Street to 193 Carlisle Street, St.Kilda. This was a smaller shop with a large dwelling and there they remained until 1975. He purchased a dwelling in 3 Liscard Street, Elsternwick and lived there for 52 years. His wife Ann passed away in 1985.

Stephen was fortunate to have nine grandchildren: Georgina, Natasha, Stephanie, Stephen, Andrew, Alexander, Elia, Katrina, Stephen. Seven great grandchildren: Bella, Cherry, Zephyr, Arthur, Archie, George, Lucy. He was Father-in-law to: Christo, Jane and George.

Stephen was a proud Greek and the Patriarch of his family and constantly reminded them of their Kastellorizian heritage. He instilled to all that they should be always proud and preserve their cultural history. On a daily basis he would emphasise to us the Grecian influences on all walks of life.

Stephen witnessed great changes and upheaval in Australian life and faced many personal challenges along the way. He made great sacrifices and maintained strong and enduring values of family during his long life. He was very welcoming to all his family and friends and was a great listener to all and wasn't afraid to strongly express his philosophical views. He was blessed with a fantastic memory, robust good health and was an inspiration to all during his long life.

In his youth in Kastellorizo, Stephen was known for his swimming and running prowess which he continued to exhibit in many Kazzie picnics here in Melbourne. He had an active intellect and whilst self educated, was very knowledgeable about history and world affairs.

He will be sadly missed by his adoring family, relatives and many loyal friends. He will remain in our hearts forever.

God bless you Steve! [And Dad!]

Rest in peace.

Today is a sad day for us all, but in a sense it is a happy day to celebrate the life of my father Stephen Paltos who was an extraordinary man. You would have read in the printed eulogy, the incredible journey of his life and the challenges he faced along the way. Dad saw many things during his long life. World War 1 and 2, the Depression, the invention of radio and telephone, T.V., mobile phones. computers, advancement of aeroplane travel, fashion trends [the bikini, he liked that!] Fracouthes he'd say then 'treponde' [you have to be Greek to understand]. He saw man walk on the moon, medical discoveries. Lastly the Greek financial crisis [not too pleased about that].

Dad was an avid reader and a great student of history. I can recall my father buying a set of *Encyclopaedia Britannica* from a family relation [Peter Demos] who by the way represented Australia in basketball at the Olympic games.

Dad read the set from cover to cover, doing his reading at night after work. We would have numerous arguments about dates and history [it's difficult having two know-alls in the family, as you all would appreciate]. But I can recall when Jane and I went to Venice and we were standing in St. Mark's square and looking at St. Marks church which has a magnificent facade of statues and ornate frescoes depicting the story of Christ. I rang Dad and he said 'Are you out the front? ' I said 'yes'. He said 'see the statue of the 4 horsemen at the front, they were brought from Constantinople'. I was flabbergasted. I rang dad from Paris, told him I was at the Eiffel tower. He said 'you know it was built as a temporary structure for a world fair in 1889 which coincided with the 100th anniversary of the French revolution. [Unbelievable]. He didn't know the date of the battle of Hastings in 1066. [I told him!]. Dad was blessed with a high intellect and a photographic memory.

In 1980 I took dad and mum to Greece and back to the island of Kastellorizo where he was born in 1911 and had not returned since he emigrated in 1928 [52 years]. I may add that dad had not travelled the world, unbelievably he had not been any further than Rhodes [a large island about 12 hours away on the ferry]. Circumstances and the responsibility of family was the reason.

My dad was of the old generation, tough [didn't show emotion] but when the ferry entered the harbour, tears streamed down his cheeks. That was a wonderful time for us both with dad showing me the fabulous island, where he went to school and played, where he swam, places of interest and of course the history. Dad had never been to mainland Greece but all the knowledge came to the fore. Suddenly all his reading came alive. The Acropolis, temple of Delphi and numerous other archaeological sights, he knew about it. That was dad!

In later years he loved watching all sport on TV. Racing, [he's in the Guinness book of records as one of the oldest punters at the tab]. Football, he followed St. Kilda [lived in the area for over 46 years] celebrated their 1966 premiership. He loved Hawthorn as well because his cousin Peter Kanis played 23 games and his brother con played with the reserves. He was always crook on Peter Daicos who was a Greek but called himself a Macedonian." "He's no good" Pop would say. We never heard the end of Steve Malaxos who was a Kazzie and who played for West Coast Eagles and Hawthorn. He was interested in tennis [loved Roger Federer and Pete Sampras], cricket [he broke Don Bradman's record and made 100, a great innings!], Soccer, athletics and of course the Olympic games, which he watched from start to finish.

He loved company and he was a great cook and always had something on the stove, which you could never refuse. Dad got great pleasure out of growing his tomatoes and cucumbers and sharing them with you.

But family was paramount to dad!

If you were to visit Dad's house, you would see all the family photos proudly displayed throughout. We were privileged to have him attend the graduation ceremonies of his daughter Christine and of his grandchildren, Elia and Stephen Dimer, Stephen and Alexander Paltos, Georgina and Natasha Mingos. Dad photographed at their side celebrating their scholastic achievement.

It was only a few weeks ago [Sunday, 30<sup>th</sup> October] That many of us here today, celebrated Dad's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday. Dad steeled himself to keep that date despite the onset of medical problems. We thought he would stay '20 minutes' but to our amazement he

stayed all afternoon. We saw a little bit of the 'Dad' of old, recognizing many of his relations young and old and proffering little anecdotes from his amazing memory. He told Michael Spartels 'your father was the first Greek to join the police force', inspired by an assault he witnessed on a friend. He told his cousin Chrissy Zervos 'you were born on the 21st October, 1928. He talked to John Melemenis [our Alex's godfather and the best fishmonger in Ripponlea] about the price of fish and who controlled the fish market in his days as a shop proprietor.

I read a quote: 'rich is the man who is the master of his own time'. Dad certainly achieved this.[Living to 100] but dad had a rich life [not in the material sense].

Rich in core values, honesty, integrity and compassion. Rich in the generosity of his time [he had plenty of time for everyone] and was a great listener. Rich in the love he received from his family and friends. He enriched our lives in the generosity of his spirit. I'm sure all of you would have been touched by dad in some way.

As many of you would know, mum passed away in 1985 and Dad nursed her through her long illness in the family home. Dad was also granted his wish to die in his own home surrounded by his adoring family.

On behalf of our family I would like to thank you all for coming as a final tribute to my Dad. Special thanks to immediate family, Irene and Christine [who devoted themselves to Dad]. My nieces, Georgina, Natasha, Stephanie. And my beautiful wife Jane [whom Dad adored]. Dr. Spiro Moraitis, R.D.N.S Prestige home care, Access Care and Gail [Dad's devoted carer] . Special mention of Julie Malios, Cleo Dimer and Maria Giannakis who were very kind to Dad.

My thanks to the Sandringham club and our manager Anthony and our caterer Scott and staff. Special thanks also to all our cousins who travelled from interstate.

We are all going to miss Dad's warm Greek welcoming of 'kaloston' from a true gentleman.

I've lost my father and also my best friend. Goodbye dad!

I would like you all to raise your glasses and toast dad's life.

#### Paul (Apostolos) Zervos

1926 - 2012

Paul was born in Kastellorizo, Greece on 26 August 1926. He was the son of Komninos and Panagiota (nee Boyatzis) Zervos and one of 10 siblings.

His adolescence in Kastellorizo was short. He left Kastellorizo at the age of 16 years due to the hostilities of war and lived the life of a refugee for approximately 5 years thereafter. He and others were removed from Kastellorizo by ship to Cyprus as refugees in 1941. From Cyprus he went to Jerusalem living in a variety of refugee camps.

Whilst living at a refugee camp at Suez his father Komninos Zervos entered the refugee camp at night and took away from the camp Paul, his mother Panagiota, together with his sisters Helen and Evangelia and his brothers Nick and Steve. They remained in the Middle East until 1946 when they came to Australia.

On his arrival he commenced work with family members at Kanis' Café in Richmond. Through his association with the Kastellorizian Brotherhood of Victoria he met his wife Peggy Spartels. They were married on 11 January 1953 and shared 59 years together. They had two children Kevin and Nicolas.

He predominantly was a self-employed person throughout his working life. After his marriage both Paul and Peggy operated a number of businesses namely a Milk Bar in Brunswick, a Fish and Chip business in Balwyn, a Fruit Shop in Carnegie. He operated as a Fruit Providore for a number of years and then took over the Tasmanian Coffee Lounge in Bourke Street, Melbourne opposite Myers. At the age of 48 he decided to become involved as a Publican and eventually operated the Max Hotel, Prahran and the London Hotel, Port Melbourne.

In 1960 he was elected President of the Kastellorizian Brotherhood of Victoria which gave him his link to his home Island.

Deep down he had a dream and that dream was returning to his birthplace. During the late 1980's he annually returned to Kastellorizo during summer to his family home which was affectionately referred to as the "Blue House".



He immersed himself in the fabric of that Island's society. He established a rooming house known as "Paul's Mediterraneo Apartments".

The Blue House featured in an Italian movie "Mediterraneo" which was awarded an Oscar for best foreign movie in 1991. He played a significant part in that movie, but more importantly that movie gave him a source of a new found identity. The Blue House was predominantly featured throughout the movie. Thereafter many Italian tourists would visit the Island to see the famous Blue House. He was fully conversant in Italian and as a consequence he discovered new friends.

He was honoured by the Italian Government in 2009 where he was made a Knight (Cavaliere) of the Order of the Star of Italian Solidarity.

The Order of the Star of Italian Solidarity recognised the achievements of those Italians and Foreigners who played a distinguished role in contribution to the Italian Republic.

This was a personal recognition by the Italian Republic and it was an Award instigated by Italian tourists who had visited Kastellorizo and were overwhelmed by Paul's generosity and support.

The citation read "Mr Zervos has contributed enormously to assisting Italian tourists on the Island of Kastellorizo and the manner in which he welcomes Italians who visit this Island".

Paul's generosity and hospitality was always an integral part of his ethos.

He once said when he decided to stop operating the Apartments in Kastellorizo "I have now lost my identity", but he really hadn't.

Despite his years Paul had to overcome substantial health issues. He had a strong desire to live and more importantly to be there for his beloved wife Peggy. He was her backbone. They were inseparable.

Through his two children Kevin and Nicolas he lived his life. He had a strong philosophy in ensuring that they obtained an education. What he didn't have, he wanted them to have. He was extremely proud of their achievements, that they had respectively attained both in the Law and in the Community.

He was a man of frugal words, but maintained the highest integrity and was always conscious that you do not attract a bad name.

No more proud was he of his immediate family and of course his greatest joy came through his grandchildren Paul, Lauren, Alana and Diandra.

Despite the adversities of life that he endured he always retained a strong constitution and the respect that he attained was widespread, throughout Australia, Greece and Italy. He has left an impregnable impact upon his wife, children and grandchildren.

Finally, the touching aspect that has been expressed by all who have contacted the family after the passing away of Paul are their reflections of the wonderful moments that they enjoyed in Kastellorizo with him. It is clear through their comments that he left his own imprint upon those who came across him".

#### John Augustes

1930 - 2011

John Augustes (1930 – 2011) was the second son of Emmanuel (dec. 1988) and Flora (nee Gergiou dec. 1953); he was younger brother to Angelo (dec 1995) and older brother to Peter, Krystalla (dec 1982), and Tasia.

John was born in Melbourne and grew up in pre-war St. Kilda, where his father owned a fruit shop in Carlisle St. Though he enjoyed school, life in Melbourne during the war meant that John had to help put some food on the table, and so began his working life at 14. By the time he was 22 he was head of room service at the Menzies Hotel in Collins St., and in 1955 John travelled to Greece to marry.

John was a proud and dignified man, and this was evident when he chose not to stay in Athens and marry his fiancé Anna, because, unaware of the social snobbery of middle class Athenians of the 1950's, he was asked to be someone he wasn't, something he would never be prepared to do. He developed a love for travel while in Europe, a love that he passed onto his children. On his return to Australia, he met Marika Heiladakis, and they married in 1957. They had two sons, Emanuel and George.

John, with his beloved Marika, worked 16 hour days, 7 days a week, for years at a time in small businesses. Not wanting their boys to struggle as much as they did, they made great sacrifices to ensure the boys received the best education possible, and both were immensely proud when the boys graduated from university into safe and secure professions.

John was a great believer in the educative value of travel. He wanted the boys, then aged 10 and 8, to experience the wonders of travelling on an ocean liner, so John booked passage on a ship to Sydney. John enjoyed 4 course meals and long walks on the decks taking in the sea air, while Marika and the boys were lying in their bunks hoping this small version of hell would soon be over. Undeterred, John tried again 4 years later when the family made it to Europe, this time by airplane. It was a great success.

John was also a proud Freemason. He joined in 1952, and in 1983 was a founding member of the Gregorios Lodge, a lodge for freemasons of Greek heritage. In 1987 he served as Master of the Lodge.

But the hard work took its toll. John's world collapsed for a while when Marika, died in 1993. But in 1994 with Chloe, and in 1997 with Lucy, John re-joined life as a Pappou, a role he loved. He also returned to Greece and Europe, and fulfilled a long held wish to see the great palaces and cathedrals of Russia, and was again thrilled to see his team, Collingwood, win the 2010 premiership.

Having defied predictions about his health for over a decade, John died peacefully in his sleep in the early morning of October tenth at the Northern Health Palliative Care Unit in Broadmeadows. He was very happy and contented in the 3 weeks he spent there, and was lucid and engaged with visitors to the very end. The staff treated him with the utmost care and respect, and the family would like to thank them all. John was thoroughly decent and honest. He was a truly good man who should have been proud of his life as a husband, father, grand-father, brother, uncle, and friend. He will be sadly missed.
