

We print part of a letter received from the President of the New South Wales Club, Mr. Costa Vertzayias.

"I was recently in Castellorizo and am pleased to report first hand that there has been real progress made on the island. The wharf is done, the airport strip is close to completion, the museum building is a delight, the Kazerma is almost completed and also is the Medical Clinic.

Another matter that I wish to raise is the news that a non-Castellorizian has been given the green light to build a hotel in Castellorizo. This has stirred up a number of Castellorizians and is becoming a controversial topic.

We must, however, not lose sight of the fact that our primary concern is Castellorizo.

I would also like to bring up the matter which was discussed in Perth at the Convention earlier this year, and that was the formation of a Company in which the Castellorizian Brotherhoods and Individuals would be shareholders, and the object of this Company would be to build a Youth Hostel on the island. It is likely that the Greek Government would also subsidise this project."

# THAAO PENGHLIS \*\* A SHINING STAR.

("Young World" with Joan Messaris). (3 January, 1985.)

This festive season has been a very special time for Hollywood star, THAAO PENGHLIS, as it has been the first Christmas-New Year break in fifteen years that he has spent with his family back here in his birthplace, Sydney!

Indeed it was a great Christmas delight for me also, to have been given the opportunity to meet Thaao, at his parents' home in Kingsford.

I must confess I thoroughly appreciated the fact that the actor who ranks among the top ten on American television actually took 90 minutes from his busy schedule to talk to "Young World" on a variety of topics.

Needless to say, it was hard to believe that I was conversing with "Days of Our Lives" megastar, Count Tony Di Mera!

However, what impressed me all the more was the fact that a man of his fame and fortune has not forgotten his humble beginnings, he has not lost his humaneness, he is proud of his Greek background (and his Castellorisian origins), he continues to respect his parents and to appreciate the values they taught him as he was growing up!

Speaking on his own upbringing for example, Thaao acknowledged: "It's a reflection on my parents. My father was tough, my mother was much more generous. so we had a good contrast. My father gave me a good discipline and we weren't allowed to go out. When I was nineteen, I was allowed to go out once a month and had to be home by midnight! Kids today are going out at 16 and drinking etc. But times have changed. You can't say they are wrong either ... I think there comes a time in one's life when you have to make your own decisions. It is a great advantage though, if you have a good training in your youth - and I did. Manners are very important and if you're brought up properly, I think you have a good chance of making it because the structure of the way your life is patterned in the beginning is a reflection of what you do later. There are a lot of wealthy homes and the children may go to the best of schools but they come out and they are a mess. Yet I didn't have the greatest schooling in the world - I went to Cleveland Street Boys' High School ... I don't always think that education is the only factor for one's success. It depends on what you want to do.

My boss who taught me the antiques, who's now probably the leading connoisseur in America in Chinese art and English 18th century art went as far yet didn't even finish high school. However, it depends on each person. I think what is important to the parents - and I tell this to my sisters and my brother- is that they must look at their children and be sensitive enough to understand what they are telling you at a young age. It's not necessary for them to become doctors, for example. We must not pass our egos on to our children just because the parents may feel that they did not become important enough themselves. We must understand that when we look at our children to know what they brought into this life and what they are expressing, because if we follow them and we are sensitive to them, I think they have a better chance of making it.

I found that when I went to America people back here were not kind, because I broke the tradition.

I think I was one of the first Greeks who left home, and what's more to become an actor ... I was set up for criticism but I was far enough not to feel it. I was sorry though that my parents went through so much ... yet now it is wonderful to see my parents being as joyous and to see my father at a ripe age with the incentive to go on further with his life ..."

When I asked Thaao what comes first in his list of values his immediate reply was:
"Dignity, one's dignity, not to be confused with one's ego. I think it's that ingrain trait that Greeks do have ..."

Thaao then recalled how dignity played an important role in his climb to fame.

"... You have to extend yourself and have a sense of leadership. We do have the ability to change, though many people are too frightened to confront either because they'll be embarrassed or because they will be fired. I was willing to experience either but because I felt my dignity to be intact and did not forget my manners and respect, I felt confident .. it's taken me 2 1/2 years but I finally gained their respect. The way it happened was I broke my toe in a stunt fight recently. They expected me to hold up production and not to go on. However, I knew there was a lot of money at stake and I was the focus of this last week's storyline (I had to fall into quicksand during the fight). Well I just said to them "Let's go on. I'll do it with a broken toe", which amazed them so much so that the next day for the first time they sent an actor flowers! They realized I was not an actor who was being difficult but one who was trying the best way of expressing the work".

Since we were on the subject of his work I asked how many hours he spends working on "Days of Our Lives".

"I get up at 5 a.m., I am at the studio at 6. We rehearse all morning and finish shooting usually around 6-7. Then I go home, cook my food myself. I go to the gym, come back, study my lines, in bed by 10.30 p.m. and up again at 5."

To the question how many days a week he works, Thaao answered "It varies. In the last three months, playing two characters, I work every day. What's good though is that by going to the gym, I let out all the anxieties, plus I get a massage once a week - every Sunday!"

Speaking on his work on "Days of Our Lives" Thaao said the past two years have been very exciting.

"Right now I am playing two characters - Count Tony Di Mera and his cousin who is an impostor. To play the role of the cousin I remembered as I was growing up you were taught both in the Greek and Australian community attitude towards one's parents, towards one's relatives. And through that training it became easy for me, as an actor, to make that transference into my work, because I found in order for the audience to understand your relationship with another character it was the attitude that was important. So what I did with the other character I was playing was to change the attitude and change the tone of my voice. I gave him a harsher tone and a sloppier attitude while I made the Count more sophisticated and quieter. It's interesting also in life, when you know something, you can be quiet about it. I made the other one erratic because he was jealous of the Count and so I made him rather clumsy. Also what was nice about it, it gave me the chance to do some Shakespeare. I did some sequences from Richard the Third, Othello and King Lear. It was very challenging. I had two characters plus I was playing roles in disguise ...

It was a wonderful experience.. As soon as you wear that kind of costume (referring to his photograph of a scene from King Lear) when I played an old man, it was interesting what came with the voice, what came with the body, the frailty, etc. ..."

Of course we won't be seeing that part of the storyline until 1987 ...

Thaao's contract on "Days of Our Lives" expires in August. What are his future plans?

"My agents don't want me to do a series. They want me to come off the scaps and go into movies again. I prefer that because you usually work for 2 or 3 months for a film and you finish with that character. If you do a night-time series, they want to contract you for six or seven years. It's a lot of money. After five years in a series, you are a millionaire. It sounds attractive but I find that I have not persevered and trained all these years to stick just to the scaps. I was offered to play the role of a Prince in "Dynasty" for example, which I declined. I would rather stick to the films, because your range as an actor is much broader, unlike in the scaps where most of the times you basically play one character .."

On the subject of acting I asked Thaao what advice he can give young people starting out in the acting profession.

"If they want to get into the profession, I would always suggest they go to America to study, only because the credentials there are much stronger. However, before having great ambitions of being a star, I suggest they feel out the talent and if it's something they wake up dreaming and thinking about, then I would say "Fine, go ahead and do it. I'm not saying that they don't listen to their parents ..."

Looking back at how he started out, Thaao recalls: "I've gone with my instincts. In fact there were three times when the struggling situation was so bad. As an Australian there wasn't much work with the accent and the way I looked and there was great competition.

I've since changed my accent. I had two years of voice training to change it and make it mid-Atlantic. I didn't want to make it totally American because then I'd be like everyone else. I thought if I persevered long enough something should come through and that's what I did."

While on the subject of acting, Thaao spoke on the leasn he learned seeing the down-fall of some of his colleagues:

"You must not take anything because of money. It is very important that you build a career through decision and choice of role, so that you are constantly being respected. I AM Greek and I am trying to give the best example as far as my own image is concerned because there are people I will influence, and so I think it is important."
