2nd ORAL HISTORY SYMPOSIUM

The Department of Community Studies at Phillip Institute of Technology together with the Victorian Affairs Commission are organising the second Oral History Symposium centering around the theme:

"The pre-World War 11 Greek Communities and Organisations in Melbourne"

The Symposium is to take place on Wednesday 30th September at the Library Seminar Room, Coburg Campus, from 9.0a.m. to 7.30p.m.

Taking part in the Symposium will be prominent individuals who served the Greek community at large during the pre-war 11 period; that is, before the mass migration of the post-war years. The life and actions of the following Communities and Organisations will be elicitated throughout the proceedings:

- 1. Greek Orthodox Community of Melbourne and Victoria. est. 1897
- 2. Panhellenic Club "ORPHEUS" est. 1916 (1919)
- 3. Ithacan Philanthropic Society "THE ULYSSES" est. 1916
- 4. Kastellorizian Society of Victoria est. 1925
- 5. Cyprian Brotherhood "Zenon" est. 1931

- 6. Greek "Democritus" League est. 1931 (1935)
- 7. APOLLON Club est. 1933
- 8. Hellenic Soccer Club est. 1937
- 9. OLYMPIC Club est. 1942

The key-note speaker will be the historian Dr. M. Tsounis who has been a prolific writer and researcher regarding the history of the Greeks in Australia.

Convenor of the Symposium is Mr. A. Sophocleous, Lecturer of Modern Greek Studies at Phillip

Institute.

The main aim of the Symposium is the presentation and elicitation of various perspectives of life in the pre-war period in Melbourne, as seen through the eyes of Greek people actually living in those days. During the Symposium there will be a display of relevant materials (books, newspapers, pamphlets, photographs etc.)

The Symposium is open to the general public. Those who would like to take part are advised to

Letter from the Mayor of Kastellorizo Ref: Ownership of houses on the island 21-5-87.

The Mayor of Kastellorizo has sent a circular letter dealing with the ownership of Houses on the Island. Mr. Hondros expresses his concern that many houses on the island are in such a state of disrepair that they are "in a dangerous state of near collapse." He appeals to the owners of houses to support him in the restoration of unoccupied dwellings and the preservation of their architectural and commercial value, by authorising the City Council (a) to repair the houses.

(b) to manage their renting and retain the rent until the cost of repairs is paid off. (c) to have the right to sublet the houses to companies or individuals. He guarantees that ownership will remain unchanged and that owners will have the right to live in the house for a stipulated length of time each year. For further enquiries write -

MICHAEL G. KAILIS

Michael is a life Member of our Victorian Society and we thank the West Australian Tourist Bureau for permission to print the following article. Michael is the son of the late George and Lemonia Kailis

of Perth, Western Australia.

Western Australian born Michael Kailis pioneered a new method of pearl culture in Broome. His name is also synonymous with the lobster and prawn industry and his ship building yards are the largest builders of deep sea multi-purpose fishing trawlers in the world.

The pearling industry in Broome was established at the turn of the century by Europeans and Orientals. In 1925, Broome had 400 pearling luggers and 80% of the world's mother-of-pearl shells

were produced in Broome. The pearling industry was virtually closed down during the war years and plastic eventually replaced the use of mother-of-pearl buttons.

Kailis looked at pearling during the 1973 oil crisis. "The company realised we should get into something that didn't require fuel." A system evolved to farm the shells on the ocean floor. The aquaculture, located at depths of 50 to 60 feet, is relatively unaffected by cyclones. The 50,000 plus shells are first acclimatized after they are moved to the area off Broome. A seed is then carefully implanted in each of the shells during a delicate operation from which a pearl eventually forms.

The shells must be brought up and cleaned every three months. A round pearl takes about three years to mature. "Interestingly enough," says

Kailis,"natural pearls, developed by an accident of nature, are found on a ratio of about one to ten thousand shells and have little value".

"Our pearling methods are uniquely Western Australian but we have been willing to share the technology. Technicians from several countries have come to study our system."

Kailis believes the pearling industry offers excitement and challenge. "We're looking at developing cultured pearls in other forms such as hearts, droplets, crosses and all sorts of other things."

Kailis started his multi-million dollar business enterprise in Exmouth where he established a successful prawning and fishing industry. In fact, a major contribution to the industry was his development of methodology increasing the amount of meat recovered from rock lobster tails by 35 to 40 per cent.

It seemed a natural adjunct for Kailis to design a boat that would maximise the fishing potential and minimise the number of crew. The boat he designed is the now well-known "K" class fishing boat.

"The industry,"he says," has shown great potential. We have shown the way with the export of our prawn trawlers to India, Indonesia, Burma and Nigeria and we are joint venture partners in shipbuilding in Madras, India, providing an exchange of technology."

A favourite pastime is game fishing at Exmouth where **Kailis** pioneered and developed the prawn fishing industry and established a fishing community including schools, medical facilities, housing and a processing factory at Exmouth Gulf.

Asked about his favourite Western Australian gifts, this entrepeneur says' "pearls for women or rock lobsters for men. We have the finest rock lobster in the world and I recommend it to all overseas visitors."
